THE OCEAN SITUATION.

There is no settlement of the problem between this country and Spain. McKinley believes in a settlement but Cuba in three days without firing a gun. Many republican members of congress led by Hopkins of Illinois are in revolt against McKinley's hesitating policy and demand immediate action. Billy Mason of Illinois patented the sky train in the senate yesterday and declared it will cost Spanish blood to pay the price. The above is about the situation as we go to press.

Columbus is having more of the genre "Hubb" than it has ever had to do with and each morning the city marshal rounds up the gang and drives them an hour or more to the city limits and bids them depart and return on their own.

We are proud of Nebraska's Senator Thurston for the manager to which he stood up for the benefit of the United States on last Thursday for the starving thousands of men, women and children in Spanish ridden Cuba and we believe that every interference found an echo in all the American hearts.

The friends of Judge Norris in his home city and county cannot feel other than pleased at the very spontaneous and hearty endorsement in it receiving from the press from the entire third district for the nomination for congress. We do not know that the Judge is a man to be easily led, but we think that he is not in the same of such a nomination and yet we believe that if the nomination were tendered him it would be accepted and we believe further that if there is a man in the district that can down the hosts of corruption and salubrities, Judge Norris is the man. As there is this is the point towards which the Spanish people in Florida are headed, great interest being manifested as to the exact location of the island in such it is located between two points: one being the point in the Gulf of Mexico from which a line, used as a base, and Key West is headed, in about 200 west longitude, the distance from Porto Rico's capital, extremely in Key West, Florida, is about 1,200 miles. The Spanish island is located in the Gulf of Mexico, extreme western limit is about 3,200 miles east of Porto Rico. The latter point is also about 400 miles south of Key West. It is expected that the Spanish fleet is composed mainly of large boats and probably had destroyed the United States fleet about Thursday, April 3, unless stopped in a manner by the war ships of the United States which may be deemed advisable in the Florida Gulf in case it is not destroyed by a serious increase in our capabilities. If there should be an intercepted undoubtedly a fight would occur as there can be a double of Spain's right to send her war vessels where she has a right to do so. It is not known, especially when their destination is known to be a water line, as Porto Rico is.

Henry T. The best business and the newspapers don't pretend to know anything about the profits and losses of such business, but they have good reasons to believe that if you have not already acted exactly like in your transactions with the maker of loans and that commensurate as well as institutions are offered in justice at your hands.
