A Big Cattle Sale

The biggest sale of fat cattle ever made in Wayne county occurred Wednesday when Ted Perry sold over 300 head to Marks & Dreyfus of Sioux City at six cents a pound, to be delivered on or before June 25th. The sale aggregated about \$25,000 and puts Mr. Perry up in the "glory hole" on finances. He had planned a year ago to sell at about this time, making thousands of dollars over the heads of the fellows who sold in May.

Another cattle deal of the week was some 60 head Perry and L. C. Glider, who bought of W. H. Gidersleeve, at five cents, and selling in Omaha Monday at \$5.70. They also got some 60 head of Charley Gidersleeve which they have not marketed yet.

The cattle market is certainly a freak this season but Banker Tucker has it pretty well sized up when he says the packers had this thing of holding the price away down, while corn went away up simply to scare all the feeders into letting go at disastrous losses. Mr. Tucker thinks they are likely to go up to 8 cents in the next six months as there are very few feeders in the yards at the present time. F. M. Griffith, John Goss and Frank Strain have good sized bunches on hand, and this about sizes 'em all up in Wayne county.
