J. C. Pawelski had an interesting time of it down at Pender last week, at the races. John went down to haul people to the grounds, and during a lull in his own business tried to hustle a little for a female shooting gallery artist. After making a "spiel" he picked up a rifle and shot for a six dollar prize, which the fair madame refused to give up. A rough figure ensued in which the female threatened to kill the sleepless teamster and the latter had the woman arrested. Saturday J. C. had to go down to prosecute her and he says she was fined \$8.15, costs and all. It's a cold day when any fakir runs a "blazer" on our Julius Caesar Pawelski for a lawsuit.

That J. M. Cherry will serve a second term as county treasurer goes without much question. When Jack went out of office a few years ago, he took up his plane and saw and settled down to good hard work, and he didn't keep his nose in the air for a soft snap by grace of the public, either. Two years ago he was, we might say, forced to take a nomination, when the prospect for an election was not promising, or else show the white feather. He went to work and won a signal victory, piling up a majority that surprised even his friends. Take a look at his opponent's career in this respect, although the DEMOCRAT has no wish to deny any man the right to run for office if he so desires. If the opinion of a large number of republicans here about Wayne count for anything, Bert Brown will get all that is coming to him in this election—have another opportunity to try to be Wayne's postmaster.

Even though the ticket is democratic throughout, that party never before presented so good a list of candidates for county office. From Charles Reynolds for county clerk to W. F. Richardson for county superintendent, a better lot of men have never been put on a local ticket. The DEMOCRAT predicts that the people of Wayne county will elect Reynolds clerk, Cherry treasurer, Richardson superintendent of schools. Then it becomes guess work on county judge, and sheriff, although if John Massie was as well known in the county as his opponent there would be no question of Mr. Massie's election. W. J. Weatherholt for sheriff will get a big vote in the western part of the county, and Mr. Weatherholt is a fine man, would make an admirable sheriff, in qualifications as well as good looks. Mr. Weatherholt is the most dignified and has the most perfect physique of any

candidate ever up for this place. He is also a good business man, of competent education. For the office of commissioner of the 1st district there is no comparison of the fitness of the men for the position. J. H. Mitchell is an all-around thorough business man; has opinions of his own and would not be slow in helping put the county's affairs in as good shape as he keeps his own. The fact that the whole county votes for commissioner and no canvass or work is being done for an election, will retard Mr. Mitchell's chances of election at the polls.

Why anyone who helped elect Charles Reynolds county clerk two years ago can assist in his defeat this year, is a conundrum. Charles has made a good clerk in every particular; is entitled to a second term by all the rights of politics. Mr. Benson is an unknown quantity, put on the ticket solely for the sake of party politics and is being boosted along by a mere handful of politicians. He is postmaster at Hoskins, has the DEMOCRAT understands, a nice and money-making store there and not in need of any 'sympathy' votes at this time. Of course the republicans elected Mr. Reynolds two years ago, and since there is now not even as good reasons to vote otherwise the DEMOCRAT does not believe that any republican who favored him two years ago will now give him the worst of it just to please the party makers. If Mr. Reynolds had failed to conduct the office properly and courteously to every one concerned, there might be some excuse to set the boy and his bride adrift at this time.

The third year Miss White asked for fifty dollars (\$50) from the board and charged the teachers 50 cents each. The fourth year she asked for nothing, charged the teachers nothing, and left one hundred dollars (\$100) in the fund. Two years later when re-elected, Miss White found thirty two dollars (\$32) in the fund. The second year she asked no aid from the board, charged the teachers only fifty cents each, had a splendid institute and left one hundred and twenty-five dollars (\$125) in the fund." There certainly was nothing wrong with Miss White's record.

Anyone who has seen the crates of suffering chickens at the Wayne depot, both for want of water and care in handling, will say amen to the following from the Columbus Telegram. It is peculiar John Kate never got in his voice along this line of humanity to the chickens:
Nebraska has a state board of health but it never works much at its trade. If the board of health were alive to its duty it would do something to reform the present mode of shipping chickens to market. A visit to the Columbus depot next any day will disclose a sad state of affairs in the chicken coops. Often a poor hen's leg is protruding from a crack in the coop, having been broken by contact with other coops in handling. Often the coops are packed so full that several chickens die while coming the short distance from towns on the branch to Columbus. Coops are not more than high enough for pigeons. Some of them are foul beyond words. Live birds are packed close to dead and putrid fowl for hours, and certainly the flesh of the living must be polluted by such contact with the decaying dead. In this manner chickens are shipped to Omaha, where cripples and all are dressed for the tables of Omaha people. Some day—but no, the Nebraska state board of health never has a day.

Abnormally Developed.
Fremont Herald: Despite the fact that the republican state officials have returned their passes with a great flourish of trumpets they are engaged in a deliberate attempt to deceive the people.
The Herald knows of one state official who gave up his pass and had the fact scattered broadcast by means of the public prints who is riding on "dead head" mileage which he received from the same source for years he has been in the habit of receiving passes.

And the funny part of the whole business is that Governor Mickey really believes that he can immediately resign a railroad passing-distributing position, which he has held for twenty years, and make the republicans of this state accept him as his LaFollette.
Perhaps he can. Nebraska republicans have often swallowed equally nasty railroad bait.—Columbus Telegram.
