Mickey and His Smoke.

Columbus Telegram: Governor Mickey was almost the cause of a good man's death last week. It happened in the Lindell hotel in Lincoln. A party of newspaper editors was discussing state politics. Editor Wigton of the Lyons Sun, had just finished a beautiful tribune to Governor Mickey, detailing at length the merits of the various halos which hovered about the Mickey head. He had spoken of the governor's splendid record as a man always free from the curse of s'rong drink, and his abhorrence of cards, dancing, base ball games and like forms of sin. In dramatic tones Wigton insisted that our governor was pure as little Robert Roes, whose lips had never touched the filthy weed. At that moment a moderate-sized man wearing a gray moustache and a Sunday school smile approached the company of editors, and Denny Cravin introduced him to Wigton. It was Governor Mickey, and he had a cigar in his mouth. A physician was called, and he gave it as his opinion that Wigton might recover from the shock, but he gravely added that the constitution of the good man of Lyons would never be able to sustain another blow of like severity.

"Safe in Omaha."

I know a Pat Crowe story which I have never seen in print. Pat says that the only man who ever frightened him during all his criminal career was a town marshal in a little place over in Iowa. Pat told the story to a newspaper friend of mine in Omaha, and as I remember it ran about like this: "It was not long after the big reward had been offered for me. In company with a friend I jumped out a freight train on the outskirts of the little town, and was making my way toward the depot. A fine rain was falling at the time. Walking some distance behind me was a short man, wearing a sticker so long that it reached to his feet. When he got within fifty feet of us he gave a peculiar whistle. You see I knew of the big reward for my capture, and was suspicious of everything and everybody. I waited until the fellow came up to me, but when he got close he appeared so much at my own heels, that I almost laughed at my own fears. He got into conversation with me and talked me into perfect ease. I have always thought I was pretty handy with a gun until that day, but the little man taught me that I was only a novice in quick work. After we had talked a while the little man made a suspicious remark which caused me to reach for my gun. But I never got it. The instant I made that move the sticker which the little man wore flew over, and before I could think twice I was looking into the muzzle of a sawed off Winchester. With that gun pressed against my back, and my hands held above my head I walked up town toward the village jail. The road led close to a clump of willows bordering a little stream, I began to think the little man had recognized me, and I did not care to go back to Omaha and take chances on a jury. This story was told long before Pat's easy get-away from that Omaha jury last month.) Pretty soon several citizens joined us, and then the man shd' got careless. At a point on the road where the willows were thickest I made a dash for liberty. Some of the citizens stood between me and the marshal, and he hesitated to shoot, fearing he would hit some of them. I got a pretty good start before he opened up on me and he never reached me, although he cut the willows close to my head with several shots. I ran to a farm house and found a man in the yard currying a fine horse. I grabbed the halter out of his hand mounted the horse and dashed across the country until I reached a big patch of timber where I hid until dark, and then made my way to a railroad, caught a freight train, and next morning was safe in Omaha. I have looked into guns pointed at me by policemen in many states, but I recall no time when I thought I was up against the real thing as certainly as when that Iowa marshal pointed that Winchester in my face. Usually a revolver in the hands of an Omaha policeman has never looked bigger than a pop-gun to me; but the hole at the muzzle of that Winchester looked as big as the mouth of a cannon, and I thought I saw sure death just ready to jump out at me." If Pat had only known the sympathy of Omaha jurors at that time he might have saved an immense amount of trouble and travel in his efforts to avoid detection and capture.—Columbus Telegram.





Bad Mess for McCarthy.

The Norfolk News of last Saturday drew a character sketch of Congressman J. J. McCarthy that ought to be sufficient to put that gentleman away to the bad in the future politics of the state. The News in part stated: "The case of Thos. Sheibley of Ponca against W. N. Huse has been settled out of court and as upon the conditions of settlement can be compiled with it will be dismissed from the docket. It will not come up for trial at the April term of court in this county and the county as well as the parties to the suit, will be saved a needless bill of expense. The settlement was sought by the defendant for reasons which he considered sufficient, and the negotiations with the plaintiff and the plaintiff's attorney were conducted by a friend of the defendant in Sioux City this week. The terms of the settlement are that the defendant shall pay the costs that have been incurred in the district and supreme courts and other expenses of the plaintiff in the case. The defendant believes that he is but paying a fair penalty for being guilty of supporting J. J. McCarthy for congress. * * *

Having lived in the town of Ponca in my younger days I personally knew Mr. Sheibley and knew him to be an honorable, upright gentleman with a good family; I knew that he was so popular in Dixon county that he had several times been elected to fill one of the best offices in the gift of the people; I knew that he wore the grand army button; I knew of the close friendship that had existed for years between Mr. Sheibley and my father, the two having been such congenial comrades that they planned and took a trip to California together; I knew that I was under personal obligations to Mr. Sheibley for loyal assistance given at a time when it was needed and when it would count, and I did not honestly believe that he would lend himself to an attempt to blacken a man's character for the sake of trying to defeat him for office; hence there were many reasons why I did not relish the idea of publishing the articles furnished by McCarthy's chairman. In this frame of mind I called upon Mr. Fales and met by the assurance that the statement of the central committee was positively true, that the stories in circulation were false in every particular. * * *

I believed at the time that it was a doubtful thing to do, because having known Mr. Sheibley in an earlier day I had great confidence in his integrity, but because of political pressure, together with the fact that I had never been friendly to McCarthy as a candidate before the convention which nominated him, believing his cold, selfish, ungrateful, ready to use his friends and then toss them aside when they could no longer be of service to him, but when the matter was put upon the ground of loyalty to the republican party I consented to make the publications named. * * *

Most any man of ordinary human instincts in a case where some one else became involved in his defense, would have at once gone to the defendant and expressed regret that he was to be made trouble, and the ordinary man would have offered to stand between the defendant and financial loss.

Did he? See: In the first place, McCarthy has never mentioned the libel suit to me in all the years it has been pending. The first time I met him after the suit was started was at the republican convention in Lincoln and when he saw me he quickly lost himself in the crowd and was not seen again.

When preparations were being made for the trial of this case in the district court of Madison county two years ago, it was discovered by my attorneys that the only way I could be protected from financial loss to prove that the charges which were claimed Mr. Sheibley had made against McCarthy were "malicious and false," and that the only way this could be done was through the positive testimony of Mr. McCarthy. He was then in congress, and his attorneys were asked if he would voluntarily come from Washington to testify in the case. His attorneys at first said that he would not, but that testimony was not necessary. But after a pretty sharp controversy, it was agreed that McCarthy would be on hand, and he did actually come, arriving in Madison after the case was disposed of. From the language used by the honorable gentleman it is fair to presume that he came with great reluctance. Whether he was afraid to go on the stand and swear that the statements were false, or whether he was absolutely indifferent to the outcome of a case into which I had been plunged by his committee in his defense, is not known. It is charitable to presume that it was the latter, because such action would but harmonize with his selfishness as I understand it.

At the time the case was taken to the supreme court by the plaintiff it was suggested to McCarthy by some of my friends that in fairness and right he ought to pay the bills that had been accumulated up to that time, as it was generally conceded that it would be as little as he could do under the circumstances. Eye witnesses to the scene which followed this suggestion describe it as being dramatic in the extreme. "The Hon. Mr. Mc. has a good command of language and the manner in which he heaped abuse upon me hurled profanity at me is said to have been genuinely artistic. He is quoted as saying that he did not propose to stand responsible for the vapors of every damned fool newspaper man in the state," "how did he propose to be 'held up' to get them out of serapes," "he wore fools enough to get into them." Of course the grateful Mc. had forgotten that I became involved in this trouble to assist him and that he was even then respecting the benefit of such assistance given by me and others, similarly situated.

When the case went to the supreme court, there it was hung up more than a year, and was recently reversed and sent back for new trial.

Knowing as I did from past experience that McCarthy would probably dodge every responsibility possible, believing that if the case came up at the April term of court he would refuse to return from Washington to give his testimony in my defense, and this in face of the fact that the case was morally and rightly his and not mine, and honestly believing that I had done Mr. Sheibley an injustice in the original publication, I con-
