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

### Livelihood Is Discharged.

At an adjourned meeting of district court held last Friday afternoon Wm. Livinghouse, was dismissed from custody, the statutory rape charge, on which he had been convicted and sent to the penitentiary six months ago, being annulled by the court. The supreme court, in a decision written by Judge Barnes, decided there was no sufficient corroborative evidence to warrant a conviction. No error was found in the court proceedings of the previous trial and County Attorney Siman was of the opinion that if the evidence had not been sufficient in the former hearing, where it appeared conclusive to a jury of twelve men—there was no use making another futile attempt. Judge Boyd therefore gave Bill his walking papers, and Bill was for once in his life glad to walk.

In the matter of the controversy over the Wayne fair grounds A. A. Welch, attorney for the county, asked for a receiver for the property. This was objected to by Atty. Jas Britton who represents the stockholders, but Judge Boyd over-ruled the objections and appointed John T. Bressler receiver for the property. The DEMOCRAT understands the receiver proposition is what the F. F. Strahan association of men wants, also.

That ever-lasting case of Hanson vs Hanson occupied the attention of the court several hours. A report from the referee, appointed for the property some time ago, was argued pro and con. A. A. Welch and Atty. Mitchell of Sioux City, for the Hans Hanson interest asked for some changes in the report, Judge Post and John Hanson were also dissatisfied with it, and asked for further time to place the record before the court. Atty. Welch warmed up to the subject somewhat in denouncing the dilly dallying tactics of the opposition, and Judge Boyd, after allowing some minor changes in the report confirmed the same, ordered several hundreds of dollars costs paid, etc. Atty. Welch then asked for a receiver for the property, and this was opposed by Atty. Post as being futile, etc., but the court kept on doing business and appointed John T. Bressler receiver, which was apparently not to the liking of the Hans Hanson litigants either. The DEMOCRAT couldn't grasp a fraction of the technicalities and intricacies this matter is tangled up in after an even ten years in the courts, but the lawyers say it is now up near a finish; that the 600 acres of land being fought over will be sold, or divided between the two brothers, John Hanson to get \$2500 more than one half of it. If you are thinking of getting into a law suit, this Hanson vs Hanson case can furnish the figures that will make you switch your course and go to Texas.

The sale of the Haas lands was confirmed by the court, and costs ordered paid. Also a decree entered for a partition sale of the Keen estate.



### A Purchased Election.

A few days ago The Telegram editorially expressed the opinion that the great majority of the American people half way believe that in 1896 Mr. Bryan was defeated, not by the voice of the American people, but by the corruption fund raised by the republican national committee. Some of our good republican friends have called a protest against our statement. We believe it was a fair statement. It has been admitted by republicans in high station that in 1896 more than six million dollars were expended by the national republican committee in the doubtful states. We have the sworn testimony of the officers of the great insurance companies that they opened their treasure vaults to the hands of Mark Hanna. The Telegram believes that within a few weeks we shall have sworn testimony to show that nine out of ten national banks in America gave Mark Hanna's committee for election purposes a sum equal to one per cent of their capital stock. A prominent railroad official has stated his belief that practically all the great railway systems in the country contributed as liberally to the fund with which the republican national committee purchased the presidency away from Bryan as did the insurance companies and the banks. One by one the great eastern newspapers are beginning to voice the opinion of the people regarding that presidential theft in 1896.

Three weeks ago the Wall Street Journal said there was no use trying to conceal the fact that the reign of graft in the insurance companies was due largely to the example set by the republican committee in 1896, when it purchased the presidency away from Bryan. The latest of the eastern press to do plain talking on this subject is Collier's Weekly, which twice opposed Bryan's candidacy. After kneeling for some time at the mourner's bench Collier's last week contained many highly complimentary allusions to Mr. Bryan, closing one editorial article with these words: "Bryan's increased strength is due largely to the belief caused or confirmed by the insurance investigations, that the election was bought away from him by Mark Hanna in 1896." That is pretty strong language to come from a newspaper which has hitherto applauded the republican party in all its criminal doings. But it is also wholesome language, as well as strong.—Columbus Telegram.
