### Too Much Free Water.

The city dads took up a rather deep proposition last Monday night and hope to do the matter well or get the evil curbed if possible. It appears after ten many hours of research upon the part of Mayor Piepenstock and Alderman Roe that the city's water business is in very bad plight, there scarcely being a consumer who does not pay too much or too little, rather more too little for water privileges. The mayor found numerous water meters broken and many inoperative, the books and water receipts found showing that careless employes had been running the whole business on a sort of guess and begot program. Even consumers on a flat rate were supplying neighbors, etc. While some were practically getting water at the same price the saloon sells to when unadulterated. A vigorous reform will be commenced on the matter—in the water. Something similar, probably to the one inaugurated five years ago when all the aldermen took water.

A letter from Jim West, explaining his connection with the H. J. Felber are lights was read and filed for future reference. Mr. West denied any agreement made by him to Mr. Felber to have the city take back the lights, which he stated Mr. Felber bought direct from a representative of the Western Electric Co. The city improvement in light plant connections was discussed. The difficulty in getting competent labor at this time of the year greatly retards progress, but Mayor Piepenstock said they hoped to have the work completed in a couple of weeks and that the cost will foot up some \$1500.

Lincoln, Neb., Nov. 12.—Now that A. E. Ward, who served as the chief man of Judge Boyd's congressional campaign in the Third district, is back at his post on the examining board in State Superintendent M. Brien's office, Judge Boyd tells a story on Mr. Ward.

At the time of his nomination, Boyd turned in his Northwestern pass and asked his chairman to do the same. Mr. Ward, however, disliked the idea of returning the pass and though he bought a mileage book, he let the pass rest in his trunk. The mileage book was used up in course of time, and Mr. Ward hunted up the pass and began to use it again, circumspectly. In spite of his caution, Dan Stephens, chairman for Judge Graves, found out about the pass, its number and all and had the information printed in the Fremont papers.

Judge Boyd says that he was surprised one night when he was to speak in one of the northern counties to receive a long distant telephone call from his chairman, Mr. Ward insisted on Judge Boyd's coming to Fremont at once, saying that he had a very serious matter, something that he could not tell over the telephone, to confide to Judge Boyd. The candidate demurred, saying that he should have to quit a number of speaking dates if he came to Fremont, but Wade was insistent. So Judge Boyd by a desperate effort caught the train and traveled all night. When he reached Fremont, Ward met him and took him in silence to a hotel. After the two were safely in a room with closed and locked doors, Ward in a whisper told Judge Boyd the discovery of the pass.—World Herald.

C., Nov. 12.—Preliminary returns to the crop estimating board of the department of agriculture, according to a bulletin issued today, show the production of corn in 1906 to be 2,831,096,000 bushels, or an average of 30.2 bushels to the acre, as compared with 2,610,000,000 bushels, or an average of 28.3 bushels to the acre, in 1905. The general average yield to the quality is 89.9, as compared with 90.6 last year. It is estimated that 4.1 per cent of the corn crop of 1905 is still in the hands of the farmers.



The Horsethieves,

Scarcely a week goes by which does not produce at least one instance of horse stealing in some section of northern Nebraska, to further emphasize the stringent need of an immediate organization of the farmers of this territory against the rustler.

The theft of four horses from a stable near Creighton and the successful escape of the thief only adds another case to the many that have gone before during the past few months in this part of the state. Norfolk has had a dozen animals stolen, Wayne has suffered, Pender has been victimized and there have been thefts at Creighton, near Stanton and many other points in the vicinity.

The law can not cope with these fellows. A sheriff in each county and a village marshal in each town are absolutely powerless to do anything toward rescuing the stolen horses or capturing the thieves. The horsethief takes a wide circle, cuts across unopened highways and finally sells his horses and makes his get away in safety.

Not one man has been captured during the past year or more, though rewards have been offered for them all. Rewards will not catch culprits. There is but one way to attempt to capture the thieves and that is to begin to trail them immediately. By taking up a watch fifty or sixty miles from the spot where the theft occurs, there is no reason why a band of farmers, well organized, should not stop the men wanted.

In order to make such an organization effective, however, it will be necessary for farmers in every county of northern Nebraska, from Madison to the Missouri river on the north and on the east, and to Brown county on the west, to get together and agree to work.

Madison county has organized, part of Wayne county has organized and so has Deuel. It remains for the balance of the northwest to get into this plan before horse stealing will stop. Farmers have become restless and the rustlers are willing to take desperate chances.

**COLD MEATS.**  
Cold meats, in the opinion of many people may be made more agreeable, when properly prepared, on its second appearance on the table than on its first. It is not necessary to cook them in the mode of dressing and serving. The most common mistake made in preparing cold meats is in not warming them again, instead of merely re-warming. In the majority of recipes the reheating is done in a sauce, and this depends on the nature and season of the dish. When this is the case the sauce should be heated first and the meat cooked in it only long enough to be thoroughly heated and seasoned. Where cream sauces are used it is safer and better to serve them in a double boiler and then add the meat.

The seasoning of cooked meats requires special skill, and it is by no means fixed. Veal and chicken are the meats easiest to reheat, beef comes next, while lamb and mutton meats are the most difficult. They need to be re-heated in a sauce, and a little overdone olive or pickle, adds to their flavor.

Where only a small portion of meat is left over, the rice or potato border is the best. It is to be served in its appearance. Upon the appearance of "leftovers" depends their success, and attention should be paid to their serving and garnishing.

When meat is served on toast with or without eggs it should be chopped very fine and the toast cut in even and attractive shapes and sizes. A good hash is delicious, but it needs strict attention to details. The meat should be chopped together and warmed through do not constitute hash nor deserve the name.

Shape into croquettes, coat with egg and bread crumbs and fry in hot fat.
