## County Agent Explains Corn Loan Requirement

Cribs of wire or slats are adequate for storage of corn under the government corn loan program, an Iowa county agent ruled last week, but they must have roofs that turn water.

This agent advised farmers who do not have cribs to design makeshift warehouses of boards and wire, pointing out a crib must be roofed so that it will shed water and must be enclosed.

This agent said that while the government is not "fussy" about storage conditions, each farmer subscribing to the plan agrees in writing to deliver on demand the exact number of bushels specified in the warehouse certificate.

C., under Docket No. ....

NOW THEREFORE, the City council of the city of Wayne, Nebraska, does hereby resolve that said Application No. 60 as heretofore made by the said Mayor and city council of the City of Wayne, Nebraska, in the name of said city, and all acts of the said Mayor and council and city clerk of said city in heretofore preparing and submitting said application and each exhibit or other document forming a part thereof, be and the same are hereby ratified, approved and confirmed; and the said Mayor, city council and city clerk are hereby specifically authorized for and on behalf of, and in the name of said Mayor and council of said city, to do any and all further acts and things which they may legally do in the furtherance and attainment of the intent and purpose of said applications.

Motion was made by Miller and seconded by Eichel that the above resolution be adopted as read. On Roll Call all present voted 'Ye' and none voted 'No'. Motion declared carried.

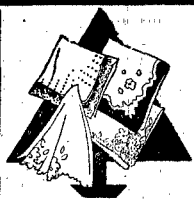

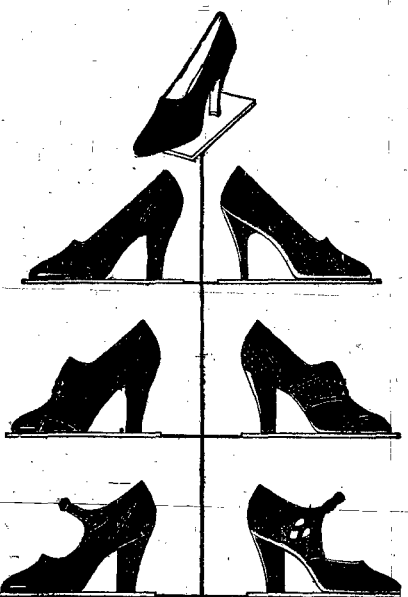
