Wayne, Nebraska, September 21, 1937. Board met as per adjournment. All members being present. Minutes of meeting held September 7, 1937 read and approved. The funds of the county and its numerous sub-divisions of which the county through its county treasurer is custodian are found to be deposited in the banks of the county at the close of business for August 1937 as follows: (This does not include the funds invested in liberty bonds or the funds on hand in the office of the county treasurer.) J. S. National Bank, Omaha \$52,076.84 State National Bank, Wayne \$3,990.63 First National Bank, Wayne 29,574.62 Winside State Bank, Winside 12,764.61 Bond of Jas. B. Derrain as Justice of Peace for City of Wayne to fill vacancy was on motion duly approved. WEIRAS, on the 21 day of September 1937, Northern Natural Gas Company, corporation, filed with this board its petition to construct, lay, maintain a pipeline for the purpose of conveying and distributing natural gas in and under the county road running east and west at the intersection of the road running north and south at the southeast corner of section 7, township 26, range 1, Wayne county, Nebraska, and WEIRAS after due investigation and consideration, this board finds that in the interest of the public convenience and welfare, such privileges sought in said petition should be granted. NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that permission be and is hereby granted to said Northern Natural Gas Company to construct, lay, maintain and operate the pipe line above described for the purpose of conveying and distributing natural gas in and under said county road in Wayne county, Nebraska. The permission is granted upon the condition that said Northern Natural Gas Company will so construct, lay, maintain and operate said gas pipe line so as not to interfere with, obstruct, or otherwise impede traffic upon said county road, and upon the further condition that said Northern Natural Gas Company shall indemnify, save and hold harmless the Board of County Commissioners of Wayne County, Nebraska, from any and all liability for damages arising from the laying, constructing, operating, and maintaining of said pipe line in and under said county road. vanced college work, the new school has been created for graduate students namely—either those with their bachelor degrees who have majors or minors in the social science, or adult special students. The new school of social work is under the direction of Dr. Ernest F. Witte, a former college professor, who has several years of experience in the field in many capacities from case worker to a recent position as regional representative of the Social Security board at Washington, D. C. Dr. Witte is a Nebraskan, having received his bachelor and master degrees from the state university and his Ph. D. degree in economics from the University of Chicago. He taught at Ohio Wesleyan and held positions in state and federal relief administrations in Illinois and Nebraska. Before he was transferred to Washington, he served as state administrator for the Nebraska emergency relief administration. Aside from basic courses, there will be courses in public welfare work, elementary and advanced courses in case work, social research, work in the field of psychiatry, thesis research, as well as special lectures by outstanding persons in allied fields. For the first time in its history, the university offers two new courses this year designed to prepare the student for radio work. Whether the continuity end of radio or the announcing side is preferred the 2 new courses under the direction of Gunnar Back, chief of the continuity staff of the Lincoln radio station, provide the students with the necessary background. Both commercial as well as program writing and presentation will be studied, including all current problems affecting radio. Facilities of the Lincoln broadcasting stations will be used in part as laboratories. These two courses are being offered by the school of Journalism. Agricultural courses are now more in demand than before 1929, enrollment figures reveal, showing that about a fifth more students are now specializing in agriculture and home economics. Poultry husbandry, agronomy, horticulture, and dairy husbandry are among the most popular courses. The 36 per cent students increase in business administration since 1929 also indicates the demand for increased business training from the state university. Besides organization and management was the most popular course, followed closely by the study of economics. Political science, offered in the arts college, also has increased in popularity so that today the department shows a 50 per cent increase.

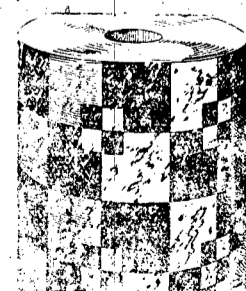

Ninety per cent of traffic accidents are caused by experienced, supposedly safe drivers, not by the inexperienced motorist, said Ralph Lee, safety expert, at the recent Western Safety Conference.

Finally, he said, before accidents can be prevented, the popular belief that the great bulk of them are caused by a relatively few congenitally reckless or incompetent person must be corrected. It is no longer true.

Over-estimating safety factors has turned many drivers who used to be careful, into a dangerous menace on the highways. Where the cars of a few cars of today do 60 and 70 with ease. That makes for comfortable motoring when all goes well—but lack of vibration, and motor smoothness doesn't help when you careen head on into another car at a mile-a-minute clip.

It is the average, experienced, "safe" driver who is causing today's accident. This is the driver who must be reached by law enforcement agencies, and who must be appealed to by safety campaigns that are to get results.

Recent war activities have served to illustrate an epochal change in the attitude of some of the major powers toward their interests in foreign countries. The United States is gradually adopting the view that in case of hostilities abroad, we will evacuate the citizens who wish it and those who remain must take their own chances.

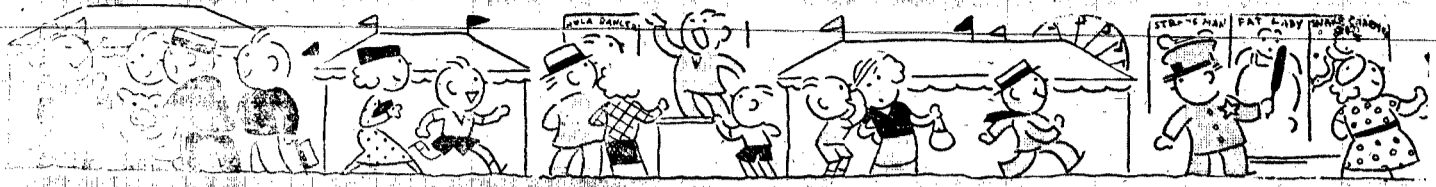

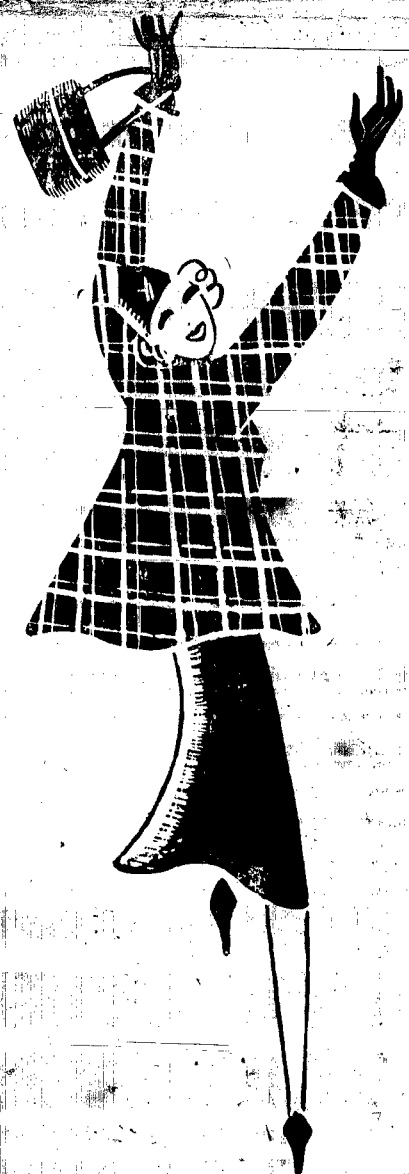
