There appears to be a good deal of backwardness on the part of brewers to invest their funds in breweries in Nebraska. No prudent man would to day invest very largely or risk his property interests on the hazard of the adoption of prohibition in Nebraska within five years.—St. Louis City Journal.

The liquor question is agitating the Free Masons, particularly in the west. The grand lodges of Kansas and Mo. have passed resolutions calling for the expulsion of all liquor dealers from the craft. The grand lodge of Dakota has resolved that no person engaged in the business of keeping a saloon shall be admitted to any lodge within jurisdiction.

A \$1,000 license went into effect in Minneapolis, July 1st, 1887; we have had a \$500 for some time, there were for the first six months of 1887 under \$500 license, 1133 arrests for drunkenness and disorderly conduct. During these months under \$1,000 license there were 2283 arrests for the same offense, nearly double the drunkenness with double the license.—Chicago Standard.

Notwithstanding the fact that Milwaukee brewers' movement their bear as "non-intoxicating, healthful, refreshing, and invigorating, conducive to health, prosperity, and happiness, and beneficial alike for old and young, male and female," the Northwestern Life Insurance Company, whose headquarters are in that city, will not employ a policy to any member or employee of these brewing companies. This position was not taken from a moral standpoint, but because the statistics show that these men die, as a rule, before their time.

Prohibition is a certainty in this country, and that within a few years. Every civilized nation on earth is looking for some cure for the greatest evil that afflicts the earth. The fact that all countries are trying to regulate it (the whiskey traffic) is an admission that it is an evil, and the centuries have demonstrated that there is no sense whatever in trying to regulate an evil. Evils are to be killed, not regulated. The question of to-day is whether the individual man shall have the right, by means of poison, to demand and demand for profit, and a question to which every workman every employer, every father and every mother in the country has a direct answer.—North American Review.

The European countries spend their millions in arms, navies, but spend more on intoxicating drink. A German statistician, in speaking of the liquor traffic, says: Germany spends between 500,000,000 and 600,000,000 francs for her armies but 2,000,000,000 for drink—i. e., more than four times as much. The French spend three times as much for liquor as for their soldiers and the English four times as much, and the Belgians over ten times as much. Truly such figures furnish a good temperance argument.

The most prosperous state in the world during 1867 was Kansas. But Kansas is the head-center of opposition to the liquor traffic. Therefore prohibition does not hurt a state. No city in the west had greater prosperity last year than Sioux City. But Sioux City made the most radical and successful fight against the saloon last year ever known in a place of its size in the same time. Therefore prohibition does not hurt a city. Appearance proves that it curbs a city. Let liquor men gnaw on those files a few days.—Lincoln News.
