Senate Colgate of Dakota, has introduced into the Senate a local option bill providing for referring the question of prohibition in the District of Columbia to a direct vote of the people. The bill was drawn up by members of the lodge of Good Templars.

It is similar to one introduced by the House, but the Senate Committee on District of Columbia, although three are some modification.

It is understood that the Senate Committee on District of Columbia will have nothing more to do with temperance issues until Senator Spooner's high-license bill is ready; and the enemies of prohibition hope to have the Spooner bill given the right of way.

Senator Farwell told me that a license bill would very probably be reported.

### OUR NEIGHBORS

#### WEST POINT REPUBLICAN.

Two men at work near the Elkhorn bridge, which had been attacked by a vicious dog which was known to have the rabies. They fought the animal off with spades and escaped injury. Yesterday morning the same animal was running at large in this city, and it was known to have bitten several other dogs with which it fought, three of which have died. The animal was captured yesterday afternoon and turned over to Dr. H. Allam after two of his children, who fortunately, escaped harm by running from the Elkorn River, and was next seen near a farm house three miles from town. It ran after some children who were playing in the field, whereupon the farmer procured a gun and killed it.

#### BANCROFT JOURNAL.

Thomas Senter is the first stockman, in this section, so far as we have heard, to have his cattle dehorned. Al. Morrel dehorned 170 head for him and will clip the crew. He has had his first horn cut off, etc.

An instance of what can be done in the way of raising hogs is furnished by one of the oldest farmers in this vicinity. He commenced many years ago with one 12-year-old male, and that animal and his progeny he has now fifteen head of fine hogs on his farm, and has sold six head. Hog-raising is more profitable than the raising of any other kind of stock.

STANTON REGISTER.

The Cuming county Agricultural Society have abandoned the "speed department" of their fair, and the money saved thereby will be used for premiums on stock and products of the farm and garden. The Cuming county fair will be held at the Stanton county fair, and bring their rigs along. Our fair managers have provided liberally for speed trials. Our people get tired of looking at the pumpkins and "sick," and enjoy witnessing a spirited race for a change. A fair without races, it is said, will not attract people.

Mr. Frederick Bachman, residing eight miles southeast of town, came to Stanton this morning at an early hour and notified Coroner Person, that his husband had committed suicide during the night by hanging. The deed was committed in an upstairs room. Further information cannot be obtained at present.

The emperor Frederick is reported better again.

The Omaha ministers are now after the wine room adjuncts of the saloons.

It has been just fifty years since the first steam vessel crossed the Atlantic.

There seems to be some doubt whether, after all, O'Neill will be able to get the law office away from No-brake.

Ninety-three congressmen are on the speakers' list as desiring to inform the country what they know about the tariff.

The Sherman men claim that they have already counted on 315 votes in the national convention, 411 being necessary to nominate.

The Sioux City corn palace will cost a hundred thousand dollars this year, and will be open from September 24th to October 6th.

Candidates for state offices are being "mobilized" all over the state, but this far there seems to be few from the North Platte country.

All that is now necessary to the opening of our great Sioux Reservation in Dakota is the signature of the President and the consent of the Indians.

The Louisiana election, with its hundred thousand democratic majority, is sufficient notice that no matter what vote may be cast, no southern state will be permitted to return a republican majority.

The Brewster Democrat prefers to believe that if the Nebraska delegates will split up, their hands they can carry Nebraska this fall. It is altogether probable that the Democratic man is not half as crazy as might be inferred from such a statement.

The Omaha corn palace is not to be a corn palace nor a grain palace, nor anything else so simple and unpretending. It is to be a grand "Temple of Corn." Plain, everyday corn palaces are not elegant enough for Nebraska's metropolis, created of park packing and culture.

The name of John Stoen of Wahoo, is being urged for the republican nomination for land commissioners, the principal argument made for his being that he is a Swede, and that his nomination would be especially pleasant to the Scandinavian voters of the state. He is said to be qualified for the position.

A meeting of the county central committee is called by Chairman Webb for Saturday, and every member should be present. At the meeting it will be necessary to decide whether a convention will be called to select delegates to the state and congressional conventions or whether they will be appointed by the central committee. As a general rule, the appointment of delegates by a regular convention is much the better method, but in this case there is little at stake and the difficulty of getting delegates from the different precincts to meet in convention at this time of the year would be so great, that there would probably be little objection to the appointment of delegates by the committee.

Especially is this the case from the fact that a convention will be necessary to nominate candidates for county attorney and commissioners, and select delegates to the state convention at Lincoln for the nomination of state officers. The re-nomination of Mr. Dorney is apparently a foregone conclusion, and the only dispute between Wayne county republicans here in the congressional convention is to secure, if possible, the election of Mr. Brainerd, one of the delegates to the national convention. Under the circumstances it would be the proper thing to pay Mr. Brainerd the compliment of permitting him to name the delegation.

The Mississippi river is higher than for years and is doing a great deal of damage.
