If God should ordain that the oldest son or the eldest daughter of all the lawmakers shall be slain by the brutal monster who refuses even some of our courts, the issue would instantly assume a different aspect. In that case the lawmakers would bid the people to rally to the rescue. At present the officers of the law whine that the law cannot be executed, and seek to throw contempt on those who clamor against the tyrannical and murderous liquor traffic. We wish every Christian would pray God to give victory to this Michigan mother, and that every family which has suffered similarly would institute a similar inquisition for the blood of the slain of their children. The liquor traffic is worse than the slave trade and human slavery. Down with it.
