TEMPERANCE.

The Illinois state convention of prohibitionists met in Springfield May 15 with 900 regularly accredited delegates. In 1872 the first convention was held with six delegates. It they even now down on the intellect of party leaders that the temperance question is rapidly getting into politics. Atlanta, Ga., has tried high license four months. The Journal of that city has compiled a table from the police records showing the comparative arrests during four months of local option and four months of license. This table shows an increase in four months of high license from 272 arrests to 818.

He went out and found his brother dead on the ground and attached to the pony by the harness rope. He was bruised about the head showing that he had been dragged. It is thought he fell from the pony while running fast and fell and dragging speedily ended his life. SILVER DOLLARS.

Some Valuable Information About Them. A correspondent writes to give in the columns the facts relating to the silver dollar. We comply so far as to publish the history of the coinage, without expressing any opinion upon political matters which are the subject of controversy.

The silver dollar had the unit of money by the establishing of a mint, which was passed in 1792. From that time until 1803 there was coined not more than \$1,000,000 a year—after which no more was coined until 1853.

From 1853 until 1860 the coinage was \$7,000,000; the average being about the same as that of 1853. From 1860 to 1875 the coinage was \$20,000,000, and the average was about twice that of either of the former periods mentioned.

The exact number of silver dollars coined before 1875 was \$7,005,238, an average of \$27,222 a year for eighty-one years. In 1875 the silver dollar was dropped from the coinage. The value of the silver it contained was then about \$1.30, and the only money in circulation was paper.

A nation soon began for the restoration of the dollar to the coinage. It was voted in 1878. On the 20th of the President Hayes an act provided for the re-coinage of the dollar. The amount should be expended in the purchase of silver bullion, and that this amount should be used in the purchase of full legal tender value.

This act has now been in force ten years, and has been successful in an amount with the purchase very nearly \$1,000,000,000 of silver bullion. The amount has been more than \$2,000,000,000.

A very large part of these dollars remains in the treasury, but are represented by notes "redeemed," which are in circulation. It will interest some of our readers who are mathematically inclined to know that 1,000,000 silver dollars is equal to 20,000,000 cents, and the weight of \$300,000,000 exceeds 2,000,000,000 cents.

If business is fairly good and we are holding our own in every branch of trade except our unprotected export exporting trade.

If the future outlook is for continued growth and development, as in the past.

Why, in the name of common-sense and ordinary prudence, should we win a deadly blow at this moment when it is purely a matter of choice and not of necessity in doing so.

Summed up in one sentence, our indictment against the Mills Bill, the President's Message, and all movements in sympathy therewith, is that if our country has done exceedingly well in the past, it is doing well at present, and has a fairly good outlook why strike at the fiscal system under which so much prosperity has been attained when it is not only unnecessary to go out of the way to do so, but also to retard other and desirable legislation unless one has private aims to further so doing, or is lacking in good judgment and prudence.

All of which goes to show that the tremendous legion of "proof resting upon the inevitable analysis of the status quo to show that we are prospered in spite of protection and that we would be all better off without it, will make them very weary before the campaign of 1888 is half over.

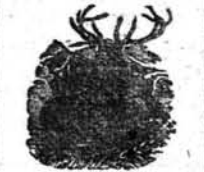

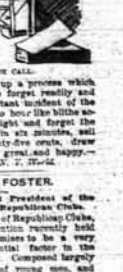

LEARNING A BEAUTIFUL ART.

A Course Among Women to Learn Patience Decorations—How It is Taught.

"The course for women just now," said a gentleman associated with a number of manufacturers, "is to show in their own persons, the decorated work done by themselves. So great has been the interest on the part of women in fancy work and so many have been the applications for instruction in the art that we opened a school in the decorative department of our manufactory. It is only natural that the work the ladies desire to do is of the kind that we call fancy work, which is the carrying out on pottery of designs that have been made by the manufacturing of dices, books and the like. Ordinarily we were made in regard to this sort of work. The beginning was first made in the decoration in color, and afterwards in the gold." "What are the requirements of a young woman necessary to begin this work?"

"And lady, young or old, who possesses a little aptitude for this work and an ordinary amount of industry and perseverance can become fairly proficient in a few lessons, even if she has some aptitude of the kind before. I have seen a woman to be understood as saying that she in this short period could produce what would be known as an artist, but she could do something that would not be admired of a home economist. Many say that it is necessary to have a knowledge of drawing in order to become proficient in decorating pottery. I tell them it is not. I know that in this we do not agree with many of the schools of decorative art, but sometimes we look at it in a different way. I have seen a woman do the work done in the art by women who know nothing of drawing."

"What is your course of instruction?" "The first thing to learn is the proper use of colors and brushes. The work is done chiefly in what is known as mineral colors. By the proper use of colors I mean the use of those in their natural state, when they do not show the shades which they do after they have been put through the firing process. Then the pupil must learn the proper shading, so that she may not put the colors on too thin or too thick. Next comes what is known as relation. This is the order in which the colors are to be used to admit of their being fired in proper succession. Certain colors require a greater degree of heat to melt them than others. Thus it is that those requiring the least heat must be both applied and fired last. After this is learned, painting in flat gold and colored lines is taken up. Flat gold is the term used for gold applied upon the body or surface of an article as distinguished from that of raised work. The last course in the instruction is the use of the working in raised gold, in which is included instruction as to the use of the paste which forms the basis of the raised work. The chief difficulty which the student has to overcome is the proper graduating of the quantity of paste and gold applied to the object, as the applying of either too little or too much will necessitate going over the same work again."

"How long does it take a pupil to become thus proficient?" "The first rudiments of china painting, by which I mean knowledge sufficient to enable the pupil to do a fair piece of work, can be learned in from six to twelve lessons. But a specially good pupil can learn the whole art in twelve lessons. With lessons continuing three and four hours, it is evident that a great deal can be learned if proper attention is paid to all instructions. We have some students in our school who are doing exceedingly good work decorating pieces that would be creditable ornaments to any parlor. Many of them are married women. All the pupils, after they discover what they can do and the rapid progress they can make in a short time, become most earnest and enthusiastic over their work. Four ladies come every day and work steadily from 11 o'clock in the morning to 4:30 in the afternoon. Two of them have decorated large vases in various designs that were twenty-six inches high. The chief difficulty on no one of these was large roses and leaves in gold, and on the other a Dresden blue body with gold."

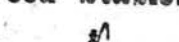
