The east and west convention that met at St. Louis attracted little attention and aroused but little interest. There is no real work that had been done before, and the only thing that had even a flavor of uncertainty was as to whom the president might nominate for vice president.

Cleveland was renominated at St. Louis yesterday by acclamation, as it had been pre-arranged that he would be. According to the latest report received here the convention had adjourned until today without making a nomination for vice president, but Cleveland will undoubtedly receive the nomination.

There is no disguising the fact that the corn crop is in serious danger. The unfavorable weather has delayed plowing, planting and cultivating, and since the corn was planted it has made but little growth. The most favorable weather is needed from this time on to insure a first class crop, or even a good one. Two weeks more of cold weather would be a very serious matter to this section.

There is a movement on foot again at Omaha to review the time-worn scheme of building a road to the north with horse capital. This is not the first time such statements have been put out, and it will require some actual work to convince anyone that Omaha had at least awakened to the importance of securing better communications with a vast country from which it is at present cut off.
