Just about the needed amount of rain fell here last Monday evening. Eight miles north there was double the amount that fell here, and still further north the down-pour was terrific.

Heavy storms have visited various parts of the country this week.

The Nebraska-Chautauque assembly at Crete ended Sunday after the most successful meeting in its history.

The republicans made no effort to put sugar on the free list, or at least largely reduce the tariff, but as sugar is a product of a Democratic state, the democrats refused to agree to any reduction.

According to the Railway Age, the amount of new railroads built thus far this year has exceeded in the history of the country but once, last year. It is thought that the total mileage for the year will reach ten thousand miles.

A train crossed northern Iowa, last Tuesday, covering a territory nearly a hundred miles long and a mile wide. Nearly all the property in its track was destroyed and a good deal of stock was killed—but no human lives were lost.

It looks as though there would be a fight in New York between Gov. Hill and Secretary Whitney for the nomination for governor. The democrats will not support Hill, and if the administration forces the nomination of Whitney over Hill, he will see to it that there is a defection in the camp. There's fun ahead.

The fact that the bastards is mentioned exclusively in Great Britain makes it an appropriate Democratic emblem, but it doesn't appear to take with the people. Even a good many democrats have concluded that there is too much dog and too little America in the campaign on their side. Omaha Republican.

New York Press: This Mugwump business is getting a tried mixer. The Philadelphia Press claims there are no Mugwumps this year, because some of those who were Mugwumps have been driven back to the Republican camp by the hypocrisy of an administration they feel in secret. While the others have gone over to the free traders, where they properly belong. There are some Mugwumps in this year—they came from the Democratic party. Scarcely a day passes that some prominent Democrat does not beat the free trade ticket and declare himself in favor of Harrison and Morton and protection to American industries.

New York Sun, dem. Free trade means putting all the laboring men of the world upon one level of competition. Protection means restricting competition among laborers to those living in our own country, and the consequence of such restriction is that the wages remain at a high level. Whereas, if the competition of all the laborers in the world were allowed to operate here, they would steadily bring us to the lowest level. That is why the workmen of this country are better paid than more prosperous, live in better homes, are better educated and bring up their children with more hope and ambition than belongs to workmen of any other country. This is why the workmen of the United States like the American eye, and the American ear, and the American system of free trade, the republican party is for protection, the democratic party for free trade.
