If money is the root of all evil, whiskey is the whole tree of evil.
For an opportunity to improve, piety may bloom in the midst of most unpromising surroundings. A word fitly spoken to a soul, even when low in degradation, may awaken the sacred desire for better things and lead up to God.

The Chicago Tribune urges Iowans to surrender prohibition and accept high license as the solution of the liquor question. How ridiculous! The vast majority of a great state by repeated votes in order to prohibit, and now these are asked to surrender to a handful of law breakers. Never! If we know Iowa.

We ought to be the purest, richest, happiest men on the globe. Our national wealth is nearly forty-five thousand million dollars, enough to buy all Russia, Italy, Turkey, South America and South Africa, and which exceeds that of Great Britain by \$300,000,000. The receipts of our government are, annually, \$337,000,000, with a balance over all expenditures of nearly 100,000,000. With less than half of our farm land under cultivation, our agricultural productions, inclusive of five stock and dairies, amount to four thousand million of dollars from our manufactures. The annual output from our mines and quarries is over 250,000,000. Our 140,000 miles of railroads in operation give a net yearly earnings of \$70,000,000. Add to these the income from our fisheries and navigation, and we have the magnificent sum of \$1,000,000,000 a year.

Why is there want in the land? Why should any cry for bread? There is a fearful waste somewhere. Let the Republicans boldly charge it to our national drink habit, which is annually costing us \$800,000,000 in four years—in '80, '81, '82, and '83,—it was three thousand three hundred and fifty four million of dollars. How do we know? From the grain destroyed for distillation, 100,000,000 bushels, put at 50 cents a bushel, \$34,000,000; from the capital invested in liquor business, a thousand million of dollars from the annual revenue to the government, \$82,000,000, from the 600,000 persons engaged in the traffic, whose labor is worse than lost, and whose wages in honorable industries at \$2 per day, would yield nearly \$300,000,000, and from the loss to our national wealth from the 40,000 criminals, the 60,000 paupers, the 70,000 drunkards, the 3,000,000 vagabonds and the one-third of the excess in our fair land, \$100,000,000—a year lost to employers from the drinking habits of those employed, and the annual loss is not far from two thousand million of dollars.

The specific plea of the liquor men is that they create a demand for labor, and give work to 600,000 persons. This is the plea of lottery men, gamblers, opium merchants, publishers of obscene literature, and was the plea of the old slave-master. It is one branch of trade against many honorable and useful industries.

Were the 800,000,000 annually spent for liquor applied to the employments of the world, it would afford employment for 300,000,000 additional persons, whose yearly wages would be \$60,000,000, and there would be \$50,000,000 additional capital demanded, \$393,000,000, of new materials required, which at wholesale would yield to the annual income of our country, \$78,000,000.

Let the Republicans tell the country that our national liquor-bill is, year by year, three times as much as our people spend for bread, more than half the amount for clothing and more than five times for boots and shoes. Over against one hundred million of labor we are compelled to place 198,000 drinking slaves. We are forced to offset \$111,000,000 for education with \$90,000,000 for farm and crime; and 92,000 clergymen are opposed by 600,000 persons in the liquor trade, who are licensed by our government. We could afford to support at the rate of \$1,000 a year, each of the 600,000, and we would still have a surplus of \$300,000,000. Add to this financial waste

that of life, intellect, of love, of home and of health, all higher motives and the inspiration to which is immeasurable.—Rev. J. P. Newman, D. D. in Zion's Herald.
