A mass convention is to be held in the court house on Monday next to send delegates to the Union Labor State convention to be held at Chicago, September fourth.

The only republican whose registration has grown since the adjournment of the Chicago convention is Senator Allison. He has suddenly become the most commanding figure in his party's ranks.

The conference committee from the two houses of congress finally agreed on a bill providing terms of the United States circuit and district courts in Nebraska at Omaha, Lincoln, Hastings, and Norfolk...

The Omaha Bee is after the outrageously large state levy with sharp teeth, and has begun an agitation that will doubtless lead to an investigation as to why Nebraska requires so much more to carry on its affairs than other states of the same size and population with vastly greater state debts.

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No republican should fail to vote in the primaries on the proposition to submit a prohibitory amendment to vote of the people. On the result in the primaries will doubtless depend the action of the state convention, which will declare for or against submission according to the vote at the primaries throughout the state, and the declaration of the platform will probably control the action of the republican members of the coming legislature. If you are in favor of submission, let your vote at the primary say so, if you are opposed to it, let a vote for prohibition not necessarily indicate that the voter is in favor of prohibition, but simply that he is in favor of submitting the question to a vote of the people of the state, and doubtless many will vote for submission who would vote against a prohibitory amendment to the constitution.

And how will it fare with the consumer in days when the granger reaches his 'topical' Well the granger will get the price of breadstuffs at the first opportunity to the top notch. A home market, independent of a fare, a market would mean extortionist prices and increased cost of living to the consumer.

The above is from a recent article in the democratic column of the Omaha World. It will not be calculated to win many farmers' votes for free trade to say that when the protective system has built up the manufacturing industries of the country for the price where the home demand takes all the products of the country, and makes the farmer independent of the foreign market, that he will then get better prices for what he raises. That is false.

A. A. Welch's announcement as a candidate for county attorney will be found in this issue. Mr. Welch needs no introduction to the people of Wayne county. He has been engaged in the practice of his profession here for the past five years, and his incessantly growing practice is evidence of the estimate placed on his professional ability by the public. He is probably the hardest student of the local bar, and by close application has become well versed in legal principles. Should he receive the nomination the people of the county will have an efficient attorney and one in whose hands the legal affairs of the county could well be trusted.

In the proper place will be found the announcement of W. M. Wright as a candidate for county attorney. The announcement is not made by Mr. Wright himself, but by a member of his friends who know that he is well fitted for the place and insist that he shall be a candidate. Mr. Wright is an attorney of long experience and successful practice, though he has not engaged in active practice since coming to Wayne, on the account of his health.

Gen. Sheridan died Sunday night at 10:30, at Norfolk, Massachusetts. While his death at this moment has not been unexpected, the news still came the less received by the country with a deep and genuine grief. No one was nearer to the hearts of the American people than the gallant hero of Winchester, and while the nation endures his name will occupy a high place on the pages of its history.

The Ponca Journal has the following in reference to the proposed change in the manner of conducting primaries in this county.

The Emerson Era last week, speaking of the call for the republican county convention and the method prescribed for the election of delegates at the primaries, says that the call for primaries should be entirely ignored. We infer that the Era favors the old, unimpaired method of electing delegates to county meetings suggested and which is so fair and honorable a way that every voter in the county that has expressed his opinion as far as heard from, except Era has approved of it. Voters need only in this county but the other counties in the state are becoming more and more determined to have a voice in selecting whom they will vote for. In Wayne county, for instance, the republican party has wisely wiped out almost the entire machinery by which ringsters usually foist candidates upon the people. To the county officers, is wholly gone away with, and the voters at precinct caucuses vote directly for those they wish for candidates for office. The vote is by ballot and is conducted the same way except that after the votes are cast and return is made to the county committee, and the person receiving the greatest number of votes is declared the nominee. The method adopted in Wayne county is long way beyond that prescribed in the republican call for a convention in this county, and would no doubt be condemned by the Era as a departure from old methods. By the way, please, every voter who expresses his choice, and his authority is not delegated to any delegate or middleman whatever. In fact every voter becomes a delegate. We hope this county will next year take the same wise course. In the meanwhile, the method prescribed by the call in this county is the next best thing to it, and we believe no one reasonably says that it should be ignored.

Gen. Ben Harrison says that he not only never investigated his ancestry, but that, indeed he never felt much interest in it. "I resided nothing from my ancestors," he said to a caller the other day, "except an education. That was sufficient." My father died poor. I married young, and my wife and I took as our dwelling a little house of only three rooms. I remember we had six knives and six two pronged forks, six plates, and a similar slim equipment all around. My wife did her own work, and we have both died since we were never troubled by our lives.
