Just as we go to press we received notice to announce A. H. Carter, as a candidate for the republican nomination for commissioner from the third district. Further than to say that Mr. Carter would make an excellent commissioner we have no space for comment this week.

We hope they will be able to find some one who will make a lively canvass, and get up a little interest in the campaign. It would be able to get his name before the public, at least, and a good many people would hear of him who would otherwise remain in ignorance of his existence. That of course is all he would get out of it except an opportunity to contribute roundly to the democratic campaign fund.

Every republican in the county should attend the primaries Saturday and be prepared to express himself not only on the candidate but on the change in the manner of conducting primaries as well. The system of determining who shall be candidates by direct vote at the primaries instead of entrusting the matter to delegates is worthy at least of a trial. It would give every republican in the county an equal voice, and do away with all chance for combinations and trading of delegates in convention, and end all corruption and cliques. State if the nomination is to depend on the primary vote. When you see our State Saturday see that the "Against the proposed primary system" is scratched out.

J. E. Bennett stated in a speech at the Union-Labor Convention Monday that the clerk and treasurer elected by the people in every year last the county five thousand dollars a year less than any who had been in those offices before. This is, he said, in it is done. The county clerk has no deputy. That saved the county seven thousand dollars. The rest of the two thousand dollars is made up by interest on the county funds, which the treasurer collects from the bank and turns into the county treasury. Mr. Bennett probably thought he was telling the truth, but he wasn't. The county treasurer has not turned a cent of money received in interest on the county deposits into the county treasury, and he will not. We understand that Mr. Bennett was one of those who promised a year ago that if the people's ticket was elected this would be done, but he will find that his promise was all wind. It has not been done, and can not be. The thirteen hundred dollars of your state, Mr. Bennett. The seven hundred dollars rest upon nearly as frail a foundation. It is true that after the commissioners had allowed Mr. Miller a deputy he permitted a number of the leaders of the people's movement to baffle him into asking them to resign the action, but that doesn't make Mr. Bennett's statement true. It is true that the clerk immediately preceding had a deputy a portion of this time, and we believe more than he needed one, but while Mr. Steele was clerk there was no deputy; the county was not asked for one, and Mr. Steele said for all work he did not do himself out of his own pocket. The same thing is true of all those who preceded him in the office. The only thing accomplished by last fall's campaign is that Mr. Miller and Mr. Connor draw the salaries instead of Mr. Strickland and Dr. Love. That it saves the county a nickel is not true, and if Mr. Bennett does not know it it is time his was finding it out.

Some one writing from Madison to the Omaha Bee tells how the Madison county politicians have sported out the offices among themselves. With their assignment of local offices neighboring counties have nothing to do, but when it comes to nominating a candidate for state senator there are three other counties in the district that may have something to say. Another statement made by the Bee's correspondent is that W. M. Robertson, of Madison is to succeed Dorsy two years hence. The Herald will venture the prediction that unless Mr. Dorsy makes some serious blunder, he will again be re-nominated in 1890, and that there will be no change in this district until after the state is re-districted, at least. The fact is that Mr. Dorsy is strong in the people in the district now than he ever was before, and many who have heretofore been rather lukewarm, and supported him simply because he was the nominee of the party have come to recognize the fact that he is the right man in the right place. Our advice to Mr. Robertson would be not to throw away a good chance in 1892 by making a hopeless race in 1890.

The only thing we have heard urged against Mr. Manning is the part he took in the independent movement last year, but as he is again back in the old lines, this will have no particular weight against his acknowledged fitness for the place. In the first district no announcements have been made, and the nomination will be made in the convention. We have heard but three names, mentioned for the place, and all of them good ones. In Logan, L. B. Wilson and Levi Ditz. Whether either gentleman wishes the place, or would accept a nomination we are not informed, but either one would fill the office well. Both are prosperous farmers and good business men, in whose hands the county legis-

lators would be safely entrusted. A great many of the people living in Logan and Plum Creek think Logan is the commissioner long enough and that one should be chosen outside of that precinct this year. We understand that they will present the name of Jas. Mack to the convention. Mr. Mack was engaged in the mercantile business before he came to Wayne county, five or six years ago, and is as well qualified for the office as any man in the first district. With either of the gentlemen mentioned the party would make no mistake and the county would be very secure a competent man for this important office.

The Douglas county republican convention has endorsed Senator Manderson to succeed himself. This action will be repeated all over the state, and General Manderson will be honored by being the first senator from Nebraska to serve the consecutive terms.
