Three laborers in a prison on the edge of the Omaha-Connell Blvd bridge, now being built across the Missouri River, had a terrible experience this afternoon, which came very near cost them their lives. Their escape was planned in various ways. They named John Hurley, James Dowdy and John Brady. The men are not allowed to enter the enclosure until they are escorted by a warden. They were taken to a cell at 7 o'clock this morning. When 9 o'clock came they did not emerge, but instead signaled the warden they were unable to come out. One of the doors of the block through which the men pass from the entrance into the forty pounds of pressure under which they work had been completely fast, while they were about to enter. The warden shot down the caisson. The forty-pound pressure kept the water back, and the men dared not open the lower door, as the water would have rushed in and drowned them. By hard work they got the door open, and succeeded in building an exterior trap, and by 6:50 this evening the three men were brought to the entrance, after being confined in the caisson for nearly twelve hours. They were nearly ten days, but the first time they are considered safe for a man to remain there. Two of the men were able to walk with assistance, but the third was completely paralyzed, and will probably never be able to walk again. -*Dispatch to St. Louis Globe-Democrat.*

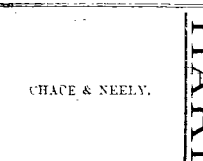
