### DEMOCRACY DOWNED!

**NEW YORK REPUBLICAN BY 15,000.**

**INDIANA DOUBTFUL BUT PROBABLY REPUBLICAN.**

**THE DEMOCRATIC PAPERS GIVE IT UP.**

The Returns are not Complete, but the latest say there is no doubt of Harrison's Election.

Nebraska still Strongly Republican, but Thayer's majority is cut down considerably.

The returns on State Senator incomplete, but Manning almost certainly elected.

Wayne county does not do very well by the ticket, and gives Ley enough votes to put him nearly a hundred ahead in the district.

Mettlen gives a surprise party and is again elected Commissioner.

At the time we go to press not a great deal of definite news has been received; but enough is known to assure the election of Harrison, and it is probable that the republicans will control the house of representatives by a good majority. Chairman Quay puts the republican plurality in New York at 15,000. Indiana is still in doubt, and Connecticut is democratic by a few hundred, but this furnishes

no consolation for the democrats, as without New York they could not possibly win. Nebraska has given the usual republican majority, though the efforts of McShane cut down Thayer's vote somewhat. All three republicans have undoubtedly made considerable gains. The republicans will have a majority on a joint ballot. In the county Manning has a good margin congressmen are elected. What the result is in the legislative districts has not been learned, but the democracy and is almost certainly elected. Ley has a plurality of nearly a hundred in the representative district; republicans to the number of 180 in this county having voted for him. This may be very flattering to Mr. Ley, and he has reason to feel proud of it, but it is no particular credit to the republicans in the county that they permitted themselves to be beaten. Wright for county attorney, and Carter for commissioner have good majorities. The biggest surprise is the defeat of Ex-leben by Mettlen.

The bridge at Sioux City will be ready for use early in December, and a complete change in the running of tannins on the Nebraska division is expected to follow. What the changes

will be is not yet known, of course, but there is no doubt that there will be more and better trains, and a large increase in travel, that will make this entire section better known and better appreciated. The bridge will without doubt bring more railroads, and within the next few years greatly increase the population of northeastern Nebraska. It may possibly even reach Omaha to a realization of the fact that unless she builds some railroads to the north that Sioux City will get the entire trade of a large part of the state.

The people of the country, with the exception of those who make their living out of politics, and to whom a presidential election is their principal harvest, will return thanks that it is four years before they will have to go through another national election.

In the next presidential campaign Nebraska will be a more important factor. Instead of the five votes we now have we will have eight or ten after the apportionment is made under the census of 1890.

Thursday, the 29th inst., has been designated by the President as Thanksgiving.

### UNPLEASANT PEOPLE

Unfortunates who are constantly doing the Wrong Thing. They come like a whirlwind and they go as they come, says the London Quaker. In their presence all things quiet. When they greet you it is an act of the conventional formula and ask how you are in other words than those for the most part used. Sometimes they do not ask at all, but dash into the room with their breezy ways and dashed atmosphere and break with you as if you were a wall. "I've come to tell you my dinner at Mrs. So-and-So's," they say in a voice which would make it self heard through the fog as clearly as the horn of the steam whistle.

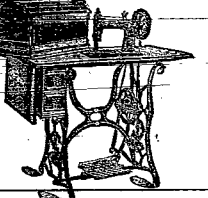
