Wheat in the northwest continues very firm. The total salmon pack of Alaska this season is 7,000 cases. France has concluded not to remove the import duty on grain. The recent frosts have badly damaged the Maine cranberry crop. Fish are reported very scarce off the Greenland coast and in North Bay. The spring crop of California wool is considerably short of that of 1887. The production of anthracite coal during August amounted to 4,467,500 tons. The number of sheep in Great Britain has fallen of 490,000 within the past year. The people of Newfoundland are not desist of meeting with the dominion of Canada. The ratio crop of California is now estimated at from 800,000 to 1,000,000 boxes for this year. During the last year sheep in Iowa decreased by 29,800 head. The decrease in Illinois was 71,345 head. The Argentine Republic exported 874,600 tons of wool in 1887. This was four times as many as were exported in 1885. The crops in Bombay and Pecora are threatened by drought and the government is preparing to take severe steps. A New York physician says excessive gun chewing ruins the enamel, makes the teeth carious and spoils the complexion. A bill has been introduced in congress offering a reward of 100,000 to any one who can discover the cause, remedy and treatment of yellow fever. The free-trade business does not seem to have taken with the western farmers very strongly.

Carrels will probably not make a very vigorous contest for the speakership in the next house.

Even Cleveland's English friends have gone back on him on account of his treatment of Southville-Wash.

White Nebraska has been basking under balmy skies, many parts of the country have been visited by heavy snows and disastrous storms.

W. C. Huse & Son, who have made the Omaha Journal one of the best and brightest papers of northern Nebraska, have bought the Norfolk News.

The newspapers are busily engaged in constructing a cabinet for General Harrison. After they are through he will take a hand in the matter.

The movement to organize the territory of Oklahoma is again brought to life by a call for an inter-state convention at Wichita, Kansas.

Will some of our union labor friends carry the news to Knox, of Cass county, that "Irvinville" Jim Weaver was knocked out of time over in Iowa.

If you want to see a chap who is particularly tickled over the result of the election, hunt up a Dakota man. His enthusiasm will make your hair stand on end.

Are the democrats resigned to the result? "Resigned," said my brother Gensho, when asked if his wife was resigned to die, "resigned, mein Gott, she had to be."

It used to be a common expression in Iowa that that state would go democratic when header froze over. The informal reports are evidently still in a lively state of eruption.

Delaware, which has for generations been rock-rooted in its democracy, surprises the country by electing a republican majority to the legislature, and will for the first time have a republican to represent her in the United States senate.

The election returns show that at the last election about 187,000 votes were cast this year in Nebraska. A comparison of this with the vote cast in previous years, when the population of the state was known, indicates a present population of something over a million. It is fair to presume that the census of 1890 will show that Nebraska has a population of twice hundred thousand.

Before another presidential election the census of 1890 will have been taken, and a reappointment of representatives made. The great north-west will have many more electoral votes, and there is probably not a single democratic state except Texas that will increase its number of representatives. This with the increase that will come by the admission of the Dakotas, Montanas, Washington and other territories will give the republicans such an advantage that the democrats can not enter upon the campaign with any hope of success.

The Sioux City bridge is to be ready for travel on the 25th inst. and Sioux City proposes to celebrate the auspicious event in the highest style of the art.

The republican candidate for governor of Indiana has a plurality of 2,191, and Harrison's plurality will be several hundred greater. The result of the official canvass of the vote for electors has not yet been declared.

It is not yet known whether West Virginia will be a republican or democratic. The republicans claim the state, but the democrats hope to get it on the official count. The majority will not be more than two or three hundred either way.

A gentleman named Wetherby from Creighton was circumventing the third congressional district some time ago under the delusion that he was running for congress. In view of the publication of something like fifteen thousand which the splendid third district rolled up for Mr. Dorsey it would be interesting to know what Mr. Wetherby's views on the situation are.

The following is the vote on senator and representative in the districts to which Wayne county belongs as shown by the official returns made by the clerks of the different counties to Mr. Miller, county clerk:

Senator J. R. Manning: 2,790; G. Buettner, 2,344; H. B. Miller, 472; Bovee, 108. Manning's plurality, 440.

Representative: H. Ley, 1,026; A. Axon, 814. Ley's majority, 112.

It is reported from Washington that the commission appointed to secure the consent of the Indians to the opening of the Sioux reservation in reporting their failure to get the necessary signatures, will recommend that the reservation be opened whether the Indians consent or not. It is probable that congress will act on the suggestion, and it should. The farce of treating with the Indians as if they were independent nations has long outlived its excuse for existence, and there should be no more of it. It is simply a sickly sentimentalism that permits a few Indians to roam over a vast tract of country of which they make no use whatever.

This would be a good time to revive the scheme of an Omaha and Dakota railroad. The result of the recent election means to speedy admission of two states to the union and they will both experience a season of prosperity unparalleled in the history of the northwest. St. Paul and Minneapolis are counting much on this. Will Omaha set upnably by, and see the trade of two great states kept from her because of her lack of enterprise and public spirit? Mitchell, Haron, Bismarck, is not the greater portion of Dakota, is nearer to Omaha than it is to Minneapolis and St. Paul, and yet the whole vast territory east of the Missouri river belongs to those two cities. Omaha Rep. will Omaha "ret" supplied by? Of course she will. Would a duck swim?
