The best of the prohibition leaders that they would either carry the election of 1892 or at least be in contention to decide the contest, does not seem likely to amount to much, in view of the ridiculously small vote this year.

A new special train, to be known as the "Golden Gate," is to run weekly between Omaha and San Francisco. It is said to be the finest and most complete train ever built, and will greatly reduce the present time between the cities.

The people of Loup City are building a sad-house to send to Gen. Harrison. Since his nominal annual harmless cranks have been sending him all sorts of things, but his soul has probably been longing for a sad-house and without it he could never find out what real happiness is.

Furnas at the head of the agricultural department.
