 The Fremont Tribune's annual re-  
 view was one of the finest things of  
 the kind ever issued in Nebraska.

The committee on Indian affairs  
 has again reported favorably the bill  
 opening the Sioux reservation.

Nabobs need be surprised if the  
 Nebraska legislature at its present ses-  
 sion takes steps for submitting to the  
 people a constitutional prohibitory  
 amendment on Sioux City Journal.

And nobody need be the least bit  
 surprised if it don't.

The Norfolk Herald figures up the  
 improvements in that city for last  
 year as amounting to over \$513,000.  
 That makes a splendid showing, and  
 it would still have been a very good  
 one even though some of the padding  
 had been left out.

At every session of the legislature  
 some member introduces a bill to com-  
 pel insurance companies in case of loss  
 to pay the amount the policy calls for  
 without regard to the value of the  
 property destroyed. A bill of this  
 kind has already been introduced in  
 the house this session. Three classes  
 of members introduce these bills.  
 The member who honestly believes  
 it will be just; the member who  
 looks it up for buncombe, thinking  
 to tickle his constituents; and the one  
 who is trying to compel the compa-  
 nies to buy him off. The number of  
 those who think these "valued policy"  
 laws are either just or desirable is  
 very small. The plan looks all right  
 at first glance. The company has ac-  
 cepted a premium on an equal sum,  
 and should be compelled to pay that  
 amount in case of a loss. That seems  
 all right, and it would be if men were  
 all honest, which unfortunately they  
 are not. Honest men do not need  
 such a law; dishonest men should not  
 have it. A law of that kind would  
 drive many of the best companies out  
 of the state, raise the rate of insur-  
 ance, and largely increase the number  
 of incendiary fires. All a man would  
 need to do to sell his property for two  
 or three times what it was worth  
 would be to get a dishonest agent to  
 assist him to swindle a company by  
 getting a policy on the property for  
 the amount. A match properly ap-  
 plied would do the rest. The honest  
 man is rarely hurt by the present in-  
 surance laws, and he ought not to be  
 compelled to pay an increased price  
 for his insurance to benefit his dis-  
 honest neighbor. The legislature can  
 do better work by letting the insurance  
 laws alone and devoting their atten-  
 tion to such things as the charge of a  
 dollar and twenty cents a ton on coal  
 from Norfolk to Wayne.

New York Herald.—If the supreme  
 court had been transferred to a stage  
 of a theatre and today's proceedings  
 advertised, the sign, "standing room  
 only," would have been visible before  
 the case went up, and when the

 in the court room. The usually seri-  
 ous and solemn Justices gazed  
 before the wit and humor of counsel,  
 and were convulsed with laughter,  
 and the walls rang merrily. The fun  
 began, as announced No. 135—  
 Robert H. Anderson, attorney-at-  
 law, Henry T. Miller & Co., and John  
 D. Wise, the ex-congressman from  
 Virginia, rose to state the case on  
 behalf of the applicant.

 Hughes of the United States circuit  
 court for the eastern district of Vir-  
 ginia in the case. This opinion is re-  
 markable for its levity.
