A correspondent of the Omaha Bee has been visiting Des Moines and is investigating the working of the profit story law in that city. The correspondent's own inferences as to the effect of the law on the material welfare of the city may not be very valuable, as no evidence has a strong prejudice against it; but it is evident that the law has not ended the liquor traffic as effectually as Governor Serrano insisted and in his Lincoln speech.

A list of fifty or more places is given in which, with more or less ceremony, liquor could be obtained, and the names of the parties selling, and the location by street and number are all given.

There is a general belief that there is considerable tax-shirking in Wayne county, and that persons who can best afford to pay their full proportion of the taxes, escape it by making false returns, and thus throw more than a fair share of the burden on the rest of the community. This is more apt to be the case with those who have the greater part of their capital in money, of which they make little or no return to the assessor. It is well known that there are in this community men who live on the interest of money; they have landed out, but whose names are unknown to the personal property rolls. The remedy for this condition of affairs lies in a great measure with the assessors. They are not obliged to take the returns given them, even though they are made under oath. If they have reason to believe that a false return is made they can make an assessment at what they believe is the proper amount, and to cause any one who is aggrieved he can go before the commissioners when they sit as a board of equalization, and have the proper corrections made. Let us have a new and more accurate method.

The man who owns a farm, or a lot of cattle, or a town lot, or a stock of goods cannot conceal them, but the man with money found out can keep it from the assessor and escape paying it. The assessor has his limitations for it. Suppose we have a new deal and see how it works.

THE DEMON DEBT.

The State Debt for Debtors in Limb. From the Philadelphia Record.

One of the most serious and insidious obstacles in the way of thrift, of ease of mind, of true domestic comfort, is the "running account." Doubtless the credit system originated at a benighted mansion to do good, and, in the wider application, it is necessary to carry on the great commercial, social and financial undertakings of the world, but it is a great enemy to home economy. It is the foundation for debt and all the distressing forms of indebtedness, duties, notes of hand, liens, mortgages and a thousand-and-one of the miseries and embarrassments to which the philosophy and practices which take the hand of life.

Jack Pinstrip, who got all the good out of the credit system, there was it, declared: "If I had a thousand sons the first human principle I would teach them should be to forget their obligations and addict themselves to such. But Jack was the prince of eschewers of the good application, and half of the new-et-tum division property. His debts never bothered him, and he was a thoroughly making them. If the writer had a thousand sons and daughters the first human principle he would teach them would be never to establish a running account. No one can live within his or her income who spends money in advance of earnings. Expenses must live in this way, in fact, never have any income; they have an outgo that eats up income before it gets inside the door.

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Young couples who start out by running a "running account" remember that they cannot, in the long run, get an inch of the world in that way. They can only live up to their capacity, and as they do not, by running an account with the butcher, the baker and candlestick maker, they are obliged to make good the accounts of their bad customers by taking large profits from those who are not so good. Besides, it is a rule which, when a business man thoroughly understands, that money is worth anything only when it is in the pocket of an equivalent sum by being frequently turned over. It is not fair to suppose that the housekeeper looks to her credit customer to make good the deficit in his bank account brought about by the system of "running accounts." On the contrary, the customer who buys for cash can choose where she will buy, which is a great advantage. The cash price is always the lowest, and the cash customer is always the preferred customer.

It too often happens that no check is kept upon the running account. Settling day is always a day of surprises for the debtor and creditor alike. There is no rule in the world for large affairs or small ones like the rule of "buy as you go." It is the foundation not only of good finances but of good temper and good fortune as well. And especially for the housewife who is wise enough to give the matter a little serious thought and determination enough to stand her ground when she is asked no money to warn her of the folly and danger of "running accounts."
