Secretary of state—James G. Blaine of Maine.
Secretary of the treasury—William Windom of Minnesota.
Secretary of war—Reinhold Proctor of Vermont.
Secretary of the navy—Benjamin F. Tracy of New York.
Secretary of the interior—John W. Noble of Missouri.
Postmaster General—John W. Manning of Pennsylvania.
Attorney general—W. H. Miller of Indiana.
Secretary of agriculture—Jesse H. Rusk of Wisconsin.

This is a republican administration. One of Cleveland's last official acts was to veto the direct tax bill.

There are a good many people in Wayne county who would like to know, you know, how the Thurston county bill got through the senate so easily when the senator from Wayne county was a member of the committee to which it was referred. Something seems to have been out of joint.

It is to be hoped that with the exit of Cleveland this country has seen the last president who imagines that the presidency is a part, and the most important one, of the legislative department of the government. He has never understood the fact that the veto power was given the president to stop unconstitutional bills only, and not to use whenever a bill does not happen to suit his fancy.

There is a disagreement between the friends of Miss Royce, the billiard sufferer, and the editor of the Bee, through which a large amount of money was collected for her. The friends of Miss Royce state that Rose-water still holds four thousand dollars of the money, and refuses to turn it over unless he can dictate how it shall be invested. The Bee enters an emphatic denial, and says the money would have been turned over at any time that Miss Royce and her friends could agree what they wished done with it.

A prominent physician in writing of what makes people lie, says: "In looking at the subjective face of mendacity we find at once a retrograde metamorphosis of the victim's hemispherical ganglia." There you have it; and the next time you lie you will know exactly what's the matter with you. It is to think of the unnumbered millions of people who have lived, and lied; and died in ignorance of the fact that the reason they lied was because of a retrograde metamorphosis of the hemispherical ganglia. We know some people in whom the retrograde metamorphosis must have set in very early in life and continued at its present speed ever since.

In the St. Louis City Journal of March 1st, Joseph Sampson replies to a memorial presented in congress by Mr. Dorey at the request of the Nebraska State Alliance. The memorial gives a sad picture of the condition into which the people of the state have been plunged, and states that they are sinking deeper and deeper into debt, until they are in danger of becoming hopelessly involved. What possible good is to come from such a statement is beyond comprehension, and its influence for evil must necessarily be great. The newspapers of the state publish special editions and the immigration societies send out copies of circulars, setting forth the advantages Nebraska has to offer the man who is looking for a home, and the man who is looking for investment—but what weight will they have when placed side by side with the official declaration of an organization representing a large part of the farmers of the state, that we are all going to the dogs, and that there is nothing ahead of us but insolvency and ruin? What poor man wishes to locate in a state where the people, by their own confession are on the road to beggary? What capitalist will be willing to make investments where the people declare that they are so hopelessly involved in debt that they can not hope to get out? A flattering prospect and a great inducement, truly! And then it is not true. Nebraska is not on the verge of bankruptcy, and is not likely to be, notwithstanding the wail of the state alliance or anybody else. Such statements may do for demagogues to peddle around the country to catch votes with, but when it comes to giving a national prominence to them, they are little less than a crime against the people of the state. What we want to do is to create a feeling of confidence in Nebraska, not a feeling of distrust. If we want to attract immigration we must not paint a black picture. If we want to attract capital we must make the capitalist understand that his investments will be safe. If we want money to be cheap and plenty in Nebraska, we must show the people who have it to lend that the loans can and will be repaid, Nebraska securities are as safe as are to be found in the country. Why should we undertake to create a feeling of financial circles that they are worthless? If we can not place the state in a favorable light before the country we must expect our advancement will be slow. If we publish to the world that we deserve no credit we may depend on it that the people outside the state will accept us at our own estimate. It's an ill bird that fouls its own nest. We have not the space for Mr. Sampson's article, but the closing sentences will suggest an idea that should not be lost sight of.

"Have the people of Nebraska got all the money they need for the improvement of their farms? If the railroads they need? All through with the east and its thrifty, self-denying people who have a little money to lend? 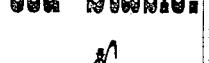
