The Indians, who outnumber the whites by about two to one, have concluded that if a new county is made they will have something to say about the county seat, and will locate it at Flournoy, or at the agency.

A novel scheme is being worked by a lot of capital boomers of what is to be the state of South Dakota. The plan is to organize a stock company with a capital of a million dollars, in shares of ten dollars each. The shares are to be sold to the residents of the territory and with a part of the proceeds a tract of land in a favorable location for a capital is to be purchased. Then when the question of voting on the location of the capital comes up, a ready-made equipment in favor of the spot selected by the boomers is created, and the capital will be located on that tract. Every year that is lost is gone for-

ever, and puts off just that much growth of the groves that should beautify and protect every farm in Wayne county. When you are planting them do not simply make your grove a narrow strip, but a good wide belt. In a few years it will be worth ten times as much to you as it would cultivated in any crop you could raise on the same ground. Plant trees.
