William Reid, who wanted to go to the court of St. James, has been satisfied with the position of minister in France.

Mayor Bronck has filed the Omaha school men's souls with grief by notifying them that they must keep their pines closed on Sunday hereafter.

Tomorrow is the last day on which the members of the legislature can draw pay, but the session will probably not close until some time next week.

St. Patrick is some of the saints whose followers do not intend that they shall drop out of the calendar. His memory was honored by meetings all over the country.

Members of congress, but more especially the senators, are trying to devise means for raising the congressional salary to ten thousand dollars without offending to voters.

The formation of the twine trust is likely to lead to an organization of the farmers of the northwest in opposition. The plan will be to use no twine at all, or as little as possible, until the trust will sell at the prices that have ruled in previous years.

President Harrison's determination to appoint none but residents of the territories to territorial office will blast many an official blossom. If this policy had been announced six months ago there would have been a great many of the politicians into the territories.

After protesting that he did not want and would not accept office under the government "Red" Clarkson was finally prevailed on to accept the position of first assistant postmaster general. Ret makes a mistake to leave the Register to accept any second fiddle place.

The committee in charge of the inaugural ceremonies find that there is a difference of \$26,000 between the receipts and expense, but the singular thing about it is that the amount is a surplus instead of a deficiency. The amount has been turned over to a charitable institution of the city of Washington.

The vote on prohibition in North-Hampshire is a surprise, not only to the friends of prohibition but to its opponents also. For thirty years North-Hampshire has had a prohibitory law, and while it was thought that the proposed amendment might fail to secure the three thirds vote, no one dreamed but that it would have a decisive majority. Yet when the votes were counted it was found that there was a strong majority against it, that this result should follow in a state where prohibition has had a fair and thorough trial for such a long period will tell strongly against it as a practical measure.

General Manager Winter and General Superintendent Scott, of the St. Paul and Omaha, are in the city today closing the negotiations with President Holcomb and General Manager Kimball for Union Pacific trains into and out of Sioux City. The Union Pacific trains will run from Columbia to Norfolk over their own tracks, and between Norfolk and Sioux City over the St. Paul and Omaha tracks and the new bridge.

It is, indeed, strange that no denominations have ever taken any steps toward the religious uplifting of these Indians—surrounded as they are on all sides by a population of church going people.

There is a fearful waste of time, labor and money in Western farming as now conducted on a great number of farms. We call attention to but a few. We noticed one day last week a small meadow with perhaps half a dozen hay stacks, which showed that the crops must have been beautiful and the land rich. The stacks were small and low, the tops or all their bloom off in whole or in part and the hay damaged from want of fifty per cent. If it was worth while to cut that hay at all, it was worth to stack it in good shape, and the less this year would have paid for any seed which would have kept it in good condition and last year's worth to stack it. We notice farmers wasting their labor and grain in producing a class of horses that have neither weight nor speed, that can neither pull nor travel and fit only for street-car service, and not good for that, and which never pay for the feed they consume. This is pure waste. We notice hundreds of cattle under no circumstance can ever pay the cost of production, and farmers not only hold on to them, but are industriously propagating the same class and thus mortgaging the future. This is not merely waste, it is self robbery. While eastern farmers are buying and using the best fertilizer, and using every way possible to maintain the fertility of their soil, many Western farmers are allowing the best and cheapest all-around fertilizer within their reach to go to waste in the barn-yard, remaining from year to year as a source of disease to man and beast.

These are but a few of the wastes that have gone on from year to year and will go on until the farmers learn how to remedy them. They can be removed easily enough, but it will require knowledge, money and time to do it. The first requisite is knowledge, and mainly the knowledge and experience gained by other farmers.
