The Ponder Times goes into hysterics over the bill creating Thurston county. Under the circumstances the Times is excusable.

The legislature deserves credit for the fact that its closing hours were not disgraced by the rowdiness that has frequently attended adjournments of the legislature.

A hurricane at Santos March 16th destroyed three American and three German war vessels, and a large number of merchant vessels, and caused a great loss of life.

The Sioux City Journal of Saturday contained a notice that the Pacific Short Line managers had invited bids for the first hundred miles of grading west of Covington.

A jury has been secured and the trial of Elizabeth Beechler for the murder of Harry King at Omaha, has November, begun. The murder excited great interest throughout the state at the time, and the progress of the trial will be eagerly watched.

Tuesday's heavy wind seems to have been general throughout the Northwest.—Disastrous fires are reported from every direction, but seem to have been most numerous in Dakota. The town of Mt. Vernon, S. D. was entirely destroyed, only a few residences escaping.

Colonel Tanager had scarcely taken charge of the pension bureau before he called for the resignation of all the heads of divisions, and although the president and secretary both protest against this action, Tanager is obstinate, and insists that while he is at the head of the pension bureau he is going to run it.

The nomination of Murel Halstead as minister to Germany was rejected by the senate after a lengthy debate. Six republican senators voted with the democrats to reject, on account of Halstead's course during the investigation of the methods by which senator Payne, of Ohio, secured his election. He was so severe on both democrats and republicans who refused to thoroughly investigate that notorious piece of jobbery, that the thin-skinned senators took the first opportunity to punish him.

A change in the law relating to the issuing of bonds for the building of court houses makes it a much easier matter for Wayne county to get a court house. Under the new law all that is necessary is a majority vote in favor of the proposition. Wayne county needs a court house, and needs it badly, and we believe that more than a majority of the voters of the county favor building one, and that a submission of the question would show this to be the fact. The county needs better protection for its records, and better accommodations than it now has, and the proper steps to have the question submitted should be taken without unnecessary delay.

The legislature made a change in the laws relating to chattel mortgages that is of interest to every one giving or taking one. The change requires that when property that has been mortgaged is transferred, the consent of the mortgagee must be obtained in writing. The section making the change is as follows:

"That any person, who after having conveyed any personal property to another by mortgage, shall during the existence of the lien or trust created

by such mortgage, sell, transfer or in any manner dispose of the said personal property, or any part thereof, so mortgaged to any person or body corporate, without first procuring the consent in writing of the owner and holder of the debt secured by said mortgage, and upon such sale, transfer or disposal, shall be deemed guilty of a felony, and shall upon conviction thereof be fined not less than one hundred dollars, or imprisoned in the penitentiary for a term of not less than one year, nor more than ten years, or both fine and imprisonment at the discretion of the court."

Perhaps the most interesting general discussion held by the Nebraska Improvement Association, during its recent session, grew out of Prof. Bessey's paper on experiments with our wild grasses, says the Western Stockman and Cultivator. The truth expressed by Prof. Bessey in his paper, "The fine-fine," turned the discussion on to the subject of the tame grasses. Most of the members of the association have tried timothy, clover, blue grass, orchard grass, and red top, with varying results, depending on the season and method of seeding. The general experience seems to be that seeding with the above named grasses on prairie soil is unprofitable, owing to the time required to get a good stand of tame grass, and the uncertainty of getting a stand at all. That seeding with timothy and clover, with eye in the fall, or with flax in the spring, is the most generally successful. Some have had good results from seeding with grass alone in the spring, but the summer growth of weeds must be an annoyance in this case. The most successful Clover stands first, Mr. Barto, president of Hereford association, said of clover, in a private talk with the editor of the Stockman, "that clover would stand in our soil longer than any of the tame grasses, would smother out timothy if given proper treatment the first season." Timothy inclines to form branches with some grasses.—Blue grass won't grow in our soil, and is a poor pasture and fall pasture. Orchard grass is not valuable. Red-top is valuable with other grasses on damp ground. We think every farmer in the state ought to sow a field of clover this spring.

Omaha, Dec. 31.—The outlook is decidedly favorable for a year of active railroad building in north Nebraska. The energy displayed by the Pacific Short Line people forces the other companies into the field to protect their interests. The Omaha and Elkhorn lines have sent out surveys to view the country and determine the best way to harness a young and vigorous rival and control the business of sections heretofore neglected.

The proposed extension of the Omaha line from Hartington to Yankton is especially important to this city, as it will, when completed, open to our citizens a new avenue of trade, and bring the people of Nebraska and Dakota into close commercial relations. There is no longer any doubt that the Pacific Short Line from Sioux City to Omaha will be built. Contracts have been let for grading the first one hundred miles of the road from the river westward. The road will penetrate the very heart of the North Platte country, through the rich, well settled country of the east, striking a number of thriving cities, and infusing new life into the struggling settlements of the west. The central western countries are now without adequate means of transportation. The branches of the Union Pacific and Burlington roads are not sufficiently numerous to afford farmers facilities for promptly marketing their produce and they lose seriously retarded and the growth of the country. The building of the Pacific Short Line will effect a wonderful change. It will compel the companies now holding a monopoly in the country to extend their feeders through the rich valleys of that section and eventually give settlers and settlements a choice of routes to the markets. The Pacific can not hope to prosper on the business of the main line alone. It must build branches north and south or its rivals will pluck it close enough to induce suspension.

The result of these rivalries will soon be to fit the enhanced value of farm and town property. They insure to the North Platte country active competition in business and building, and open up an era of progress and prosperity.

Wakefield Republican.—A furious prairie fire swept over a portion of prairie country on Saturday last, doing a very great amount of damage, especially to graves of timber. Jas. Beck, cultivator, of this place, is one of the greatest losers. His splendid grove of eighteen acres on his farm fourteen miles northwest of here was entirely destroyed, together with all the farm buildings, only an old barn being spared the fury of the flames. The grove consisted of Walnut, Maple and other trees, and was worth about much of the timber being nearly twenty years old. A number of other fine groves in the neighborhood were destroyed.
