**VAIST CATACOMBS**  
In Which Early Christians Took Shelter from Persecution.  
These are extensive catacombs, writes a foreign correspondent, which were originally quarries from which the Romans obtained the cement and stone for building their city. In these subterranean passages the early Christians took shelter in times of persecution. There they celebrated the Lord's supper and held their "agapes" or love-feasts. These catacombs extend twenty or more miles from the walls of Rome into the "campagna" or fields around. There exist underground no less than 1,300 chapels, also 510 shrines or chapels, some with steps, others like boudoirs for ventilation, through the holes the bodies of their martyred brethren and sisters in faith and in times of persecution food and raiment were let down to the Christians below.

There are in the catacombs, twenty-two miles of streets, or subterranean passages. On one of these decents is an inscription: "Blessed are the dead which die in the Lord henceforth," an extract from the Revelation. The early Christians deposited their dead in the chambers, which had tombs like shelves superposed in layers. On these ledges the bodies of the Christians were placed after having been embalmed. There is in each a central tomb called the *Triumphal ark*. In this common tomb they or even a hundred bodies of martyrs were brought down with songs of triumph and thanksgiving to God as they went by-step singing the 116th psalm.

The immensity of the catacombs can be imagined by comparing them to the extensive spiders' webs placed one upon another in entire complexity, no one knows where they begin nor where they end. If those passages of about two feet wide could be joined to form one single street they would extend 600 miles in length. In some these 900 miles all bordered by tombs and you have an idea of the immensity of the catacombs. Sometimes you get 100 or 50 feet under ground, so getting 100 yards over 100 feet, and these have preserved these vast catacombs to the present day. In fact, as late as 1790, 1800, 1805, the catacombs are named cemeteries because that word means "sleeping place," and declares the faith of the primitive Christians on the subject of death. The word "death" is not found in the scriptures, but you may "sleep" after league in them and it is not death but life, that is expressed everywhere. These early Christians never said of their departed friends "they are dead," but "they sleep." During 300 years 7,000,000 Christians have been informed in the catacombs; of this number 2,000,000 died as martyrs.

No Poisonous Insects, Serpents or Plants.  
While discussing venomous reptiles it will perhaps not be out of place to add a little information which seems to me remarkable, and which will be news to nearly all who live east of the mountains. When I arrived on Puget Sound I was informed that there were neither poisonous snakes, insects, nor plants on the shores or islands of the sound. Having never seen a place entirely devoid of poisonous animal or vegetable life I rather hesitated to doubt the assertion, though assured by many old settlers, as well as new, that such was the case. Hence a careful investigation since then has convinced me that it is true. In all my hunting and fishing expeditions I have never seen a specimen of poisonous reptile, insect or plant. I notice an entire absence of both poison oak and jays, which I have seen as far as I can learn, what I have said in regard to Puget Sound was but true of all the country lying west of the Cascade range—Forest and Stream.

**A Chess-Playing Sultan.**  
The present sultan is one of the most enthusiastic chess amateurs in Europe. He will play the game for hours without intermission, and will not allow any matter of state to interfere with the problem in which at the time he is engaged. The Hungarian master therefore plays a very poor game to the sultan and makes a great deal of looking on contentment at each defeat whereas the clasp of Othman crowns with delight and blows his hands—London Court Journal.

OVER THE STATE

The Ekhovian Valley association of miners met at Creighton last week. About twenty-five delegates were in attendance.

Final Abrikant, near South Omaha, destroyed the slough factory located there. Loss, about \$15,000.

Last week a committee from Grand Island called on Vice President Hoborn. The board of the Union Pacific, in behalf of the shop vice-pres and train facilitator.

The Lincoln branch of the Nebraska National Guard will visit Omaha at the end of the day, replaying the visit of the board of trade of the Nebraska metropolitan.

The twenty-five Duxon Pacific district land agents from Iowa, Illinois and Indiana arrived in Beatrice last week.

Lincoln's board of trade has raised a fund to advertise the city in the East.

A Kearney dispatch says: A. J. Snowden shipped from here to-day fourteen car-loads of steers, which averaged over 1,000 pounds.

The Lincoln branch of the Irish National League will soon begin to make arrangements for a monster summer picnic at Cushman park.

Using the school census as a basis, present figures out a population of over ten thousand.

The election in South Dakota Tuesday resulted in the adoption of the South Fair constitution by a decided majority.

The Omaha Republican has been gaining so rapidly that it will surpass the eight page shape in a few days, but the price remains at five dollars a year.

A movement to discontinue Sunday freight trains so far as possible, moving nothing but stock and perishable goods is gaining favor among the larger eastern roads.

The City of Paris, an Italian line steamer, recently made the run across the Atlantic in a little less than six days, beating the best previous record by three hours.

The Sunday Omaha Republican had a good cartoon representing Reservera struggling with a "Pigs in Charge," the pen labeled "Fish & Farm," and the pigs "post office," "city hall" &c.

Hereafter the person wishing to get into the railway mail service will be obliged to pass an examination under the civil service rules. The first examination for this part of Nebraska will be held at Omaha on the 23rd inst.

The interior department has caused a notice to be published that no squatters will be allowed to go upon the Sioux reservation until it is declared open to settlement, and that all persons going on before that time will be ejected by the military.

Jeff Davis, of fragrant memory has broken out again to take exception to an article by Gen. Wesley on the Rebellion, published in the North American Review. The article is very uncompromising to Jeff, and he attempts to remedy it by rushing into print.

A graduate of newspaper men with O. H. Rothacker at the head are negotiating for the purchase of the Hastings Gazette-Journal. If the purchase is made Rothacker will be the editor, and the Gazette-Journal will have the brightest and most vigorous editorial page of any daily in the state.

The order of Railway Conductors now in session at Denver, will select some Iowa city in which to put up a building to furnish headquarters for the order. There is lively competition between the various cities and Sioux City appears to be in the lead.

The eastern newspapers, with an ignorance of the subject that is amusing, are discussing the danger of investing in western farm mortgages. It seems beyond their comprehension that a mortgage on the average west farm for one-third or half its value, is as safe as a government bond, especially as in the majority of cases the land will be worth more than when the mortgage becomes due than it was when the loan was negotiated.

Stanton Register—Chas. Wirtler's dog has been chasing the stock in Joseph Johnson's pasture and not long ago ran a coil into the barb wire fence. The coil was broken by getting on the wire. Johnson had reposedly reconstituted with Wiener and had him arrested. The trial was set for Tuesday morning before Justice Ailes but was continued till to-morrow evening on account of a defect in the complaint.

Wakefield Republican—Great herds of cattle, some containing as many as 1,000 head, have been passing west all the entire week. Not less than ten or a dozen of these big herds have been seen on the road, reminding one of the great cattle trails and the herds that passed over them. The stock was being driven from the reservation to range in Cedar and Pierce counties.

The work of putting the track in shape between Emerson and Norfolk goes on as fast as a work train and two gangs of men can do it. Monday the work train and conductor kept the gang a great charge of the surfacing gang. The work is about finished as far as this point.

Register Journal—Siloa Woodson Daniel Webster, the two Omahas who went to Washington to secure permission for the Indians to sell their reservations, have returned and report their mission was successful. Should this prove true of course all the old-on-progressive Indians will decline to accept citizenship, and therefore can not be taxed.

We have it on good authority that Indian agent Warner has received instructions from Washington to the effect that the Indians have no right to refuse their lands to white men, and that arrangements be made for the reservation of the white renters off the reservation. The renters said to be determined to stay until evicted by force.

An old farmer says: "In all my experience of forty years in growing clover, I cannot point to one instance of failure of a grain crop when the land had been previously well set in clover."

A correspondent advises all his brother farmers who are putting up wire fences to have each alternate post on opposite sides of the wire. This method makes a stronger fence, and is less liable to injure stock.

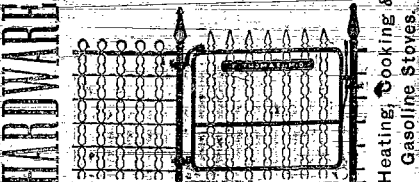

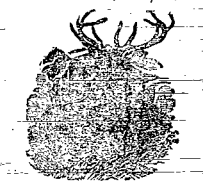


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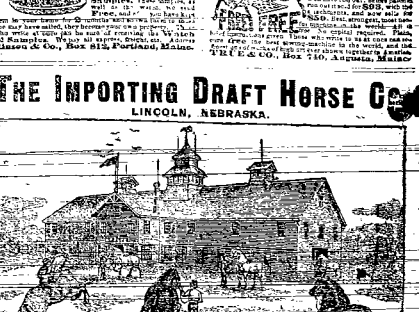


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
