FASHION IN POLAND-CHINA.

We have been tearing for some time that fashion in hogs would set in, and indeed it is. The Poland-China produce disastrous effects similar to those which have followed fashions in cattle. It is not likely to be a fashion in families of certain lines of breeding, but a general one of utility & importance to the farmer. It is a danger in attaching too much importance to a solid black with white points, ears with a lovely little drop at the point, and an oval and too little importance to length, depth and thickness, with the perfection of organized appetite, which is the crowning glory of a pig. We fear our swine breeders are becoming too aesthetic too Bostonian in their ideas of culture and refinement, or are disposed to fashion pigs too exquisitely, too much neatness and elegance of form to suit the demands and meet the wants of the western farmer. We fear the Oldland is coming, too prominently to the front in the West. We beg our breeders to remember that while Ohio is to be honored and respected as the original home of the Poland-China pig, after all, it is only a small spot on the map, where a smallish, refined and highly cultured hog is well adapted to clear land and bear feed, and cannot be allowed to set the fashion to the boundless West, with its cheap land and its twenty-cent corn. What Western farmers want is a hog that will grow fat and big and mature between the rails of the tax-gatherer, and if it will foot the mortgage from under the farm they will forgive it if it has a few white spots on the body and the ears break in the middle in stead of at the extremest, farthest point." Despite all that the agricultural papers can do, the ordinary farmer in the West will feed too much corn, and, as a consequence, his stock will become finer in bone-merchandise of fat. To counteract this he demands a hog coarser than is really desirable. We are very far from advocating in the Poland-China the mixture of we color that usually goes with it. We notice that raven-boned cattle do not fatten readily, and even fat men and women have only moderate-sized hands and seldom weigh 110 lbs. or more, and while we may not like to admit it, the same law rules in the pig pen. While early maturity is important and should under no circumstances be sacrificed, it is equally important that all the size possible should be secured consistent with early maturity, and if to get this we must drop some of the aesthetic, and break the ears a little farther back, and have a little less lovely tinge in the tail and a little longer snout, let us endure the lack of the aesthetic and cultured for the sake of getting rid of the mortgage. -Iowa Homestead.

Wayneville votes on the prohibition amendment on the 18th.

It is estimated that American travelers will leave at least a hundred million dollars in Europe this year.

An unusual rush of Americans to Europe is in progress, and the Berlin on all the steamship lines are already engaged until the middle of July.

Governor Thayer was the orator at the opening of the Texas Spring Palace at Ft. Worth last week, and was received with great enthusiasm by the Texans.

The farmers of Dakota are organizing for the coming election, and propose to elect who they properly represented in the offices. An attempt will be made to secure the election of farmers to the legislature and elect farmers to seats in the United States senate.

The disaster at Johnston, in which ten thousand lives were lost, is without a parallel in the history of the country. The description of the scenes attending it is a recital of horrors, and the fate falls in which last week a city of twelve thousand people is a waste. The latest reports confirm the early estimate, both of the loss of life and the destruction of property.

The Sioux commission is at the Round Agency, and there does not appear to be any further anxiety on the part of the Indians to sign the agreement to quit the lands. In fact a look as though the commission has a long and difficult task before it, with the result very doubtful. It should fall in the mission congress will be called on to make short work of the whole matter when it meets next winter.

McGarigle, the escaped Chicago hoodler, returned from Canada six days last week, pitched up a decidedly candid compromise with the state's attorney, walked into court, entered a plea of guilty to one of the indictments against him, paid a fine of one thousand dollars, and was discharged. The obliging attorney who was misrepresenting the interests of the public dismissed twenty-two other indictments that had been returned by the grand jury. There is a peculiar sort of justice in Chicago.

A complicated condition of affairs is arising in the territory that was detached from this county by the last legislature to form a part of Thurston county. The real estate and personal property has been listed by the assessors of both counties, and the teachers who hold certificates from the superintendent of Wayne county have been informed by the superintendent of Thurston that they must get certificates from her, or quit teaching. Both superintendents visit the schools, and exercise authority over them. When the time to collect taxes comes there will inevitably be trouble unless some understanding is arrived at before. In addition to this there will be difficulty over the elections; the recording of instruments, and in a dozen other ways. It is to the interest not only of the people living in the disputed territory, but of both counties, that the matter be settled as soon as possible. We believe that the opposition to the cutting off of this territory has largely died out in this county, but that would make no difference in determining whether it was properly detached and whether Thurston county was legally organized or not. At any rate there is no occasion for ill feeling between the counties, and a friendly case should be prepared by the attorney of each of the two counties that will thoroughly test the matter, and get a decision from the supreme court, that will definitely settle it. The case will certainly be taken to the supreme court some time; if not brought by the county themselves, they probably in some contested election case. It is plainly to the interest of all concerned to have the trouble adjusted, and ended at once.

ORDINANCE NO. 36. An ordinance to fix the salaries of the officers of the City of Wayne.

Section 1. That the salaries of the several officers of the city of Wayne be fixed as follows: City Clerk, \$75 per year. Treasurer, \$40 per year. City Engineer, \$8 per day for actual services, but not to exceed \$300 per year. Overseer of Streets, \$3 per day for actual services, but not to exceed \$300 per year. City Attorney, \$150 per year. Chief of Police, \$40 per month. Policemen, \$3 per day for time actually employed. Mayor, \$100 per year; provided that councilmen shall forfeit \$3 for each absent day at a regular meeting of the council.

Section 2. This ordinance shall take effect and be in force from its approval and publication as required by law.

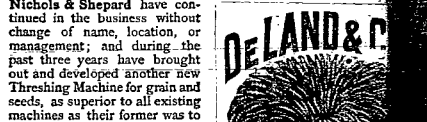
