ORDINANCE NO. 54.

An ordinance to provide for the organization of Fire Engines Hook and Ladder, and Bucket Companies to prescribe rules of duty and the government of the same and penalties for violation thereof.

Be it ordained by the Mayor and Council of the City of Wayne.

Section 1. That there is hereby created a fire department, consisting of a fire marshal and such assistant fire marshals, fire engine, hook and ladder, and bucket companies as may from time to time be appointed and approved by the Mayor and Council of the City of Wayne.

Section 2. The fire marshal shall have the control (subject to the order and direction of the Mayor and Council) of the fire department and all engines and fire apparatus belonging to this city. And whenever any engine or fire apparatus is repairing he shall cause the same to be done without delay and shall make report in writing at the first regular meeting in each month to the city council as follows:

1st. The condition of all engines, hose, hooks and ladders, pumps, cylinders and other fire apparatus belonging to the city.

2nd. The names of all persons who have been elected members of any fire company, and whether he recommends the re-election of such election by law.

3rd. The repairs made by him to engines and other apparatus, and the cost of such repairs.

Section 3. The assistant fire marshals shall be designated as first and second assistant marshals, and it shall be their duty to assist the marshal, obey his orders, and in his absence take command in the order of their rank or number and perform the duties of the marshal.

Section 4. In case of fire the fire marshal and his assistants, in their order, shall rank in the order prescribed herein, and the officer highest in rank at the fire shall be in command of the fire department and direct the management thereof for the suppression of the fire in the best manner possible. And when it may be necessary for the fire marshal or in his absence the president, any member of the council may cause badge to be hung to the engine or destroyed, or to the best manner possible.

Section 5. The treasurer shall be organized into one or more companies, and approved by the Mayor and Council, and it shall be the duty of the members of each company to take care of their organization and to report to their organization and the building or room wherein the same is kept, and to attend all fires as heretofore provided.

Section 6. Each company may adopt such constitution, by-laws and regulations for its government, subordinate to the ordinances of the city, as it may deem best calculated to accomplish the object of the organization, which constitution and by-laws shall be submitted to the city council for approval, and said constitution upon its organization, and on the second Tuesday of May in each year thereafter, shall choose from among its number a foreman, a first and second assistant foreman, and such other officers as may be provided for in its constitution in the manner provided therein, who shall perform the duties required of them by said constitution and by laws.

Section 7. The members of the said companies shall, upon a alarm of fire, immediately repair to the place of the fire with their engine and other fire apparatus under their care, and there work and manage the same under the direction of the fire marshal, or in the absence of any other officer having authority, under the direction of their own officers, in the most efficient manner until the fire shall be extinguished, and shall not depart therefrom without the permission of their foreman or commander, and on such permission they shall return their engine and fire apparatus well worked and cleaned to their respective places of deposit; and if any member of such company shall, without the permission of the officer in command, leave his fire or other engine or fire apparatus, such person shall be guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction thereof shall be fined not less than one dollar nor more than one hundred dollars.

Section 8. Each company shall hold regular meetings for drill and discipline on the first Monday of every month, and shall be held every month, and any company to become familiar with the mechanism and working of all their apparatus, and there shall be a trial of engine and a review of each company as often as once in every three months, and such trial as may be directed by the Mayor, by notice to the principal officer thereof, at least one week previous to such review.

Section 9. Any person who shall be indebted to the company of which he is a member, for any debt or for any debt, shall not be eligible to be a member of such company and shall fail or refuse to pay the same into the treasury of the company shall be considered guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction thereof shall be fined not less than one dollar more than two dollars for each offense.

Section 10. Whoever shall use any fire engine or other fire apparatus belonging to this city for any private purpose other than for the extinguishment of fire, or who shall remove the same from its place of deposit, or having control thereof, shall permit such apparatus to be used for any private purpose, or who shall use the same, shall be guilty of a misdemeanor and be fined not less than five nor more than one hundred dollars.

Section 11. Any person in command of any fire company, or who shall have any fire apparatus in his charge, who shall allow the same to be removed out of the city limits except for the extinguishment of fire in the immediate vicinity thereof, without the permission of the Mayor or in his absence some member of the city council shall be guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction thereof be fined not less than five dollars nor more than one hundred dollars.

North-Platte was seriously damaged by a windstorm last Thursday.

Sioux City is just now bending its energies to securing the republican and democratic state conventions.

The business part of the city of Seattle, Washington, was almost entirely destroyed by fire last week. The loss of property is estimated at nearly twenty millions of dollars.

A part of the Sioux City council struck a circuit for 150 complimentary tickets in addition to the platinum license they were allowed to charge, and there is a howl among the citizens about it.

Active work is being done for a new railroad that proposes to run from Albia to Denver by the way of North Platte, and there seems good reason to believe that it will be built in part at least. That an independent company would build such a road seems very doubtful. It would have no through business and no good connection if it stopped at Albia.

Had from North Platte to Denver it would practically parallel the Union Pacific the entire distance. The comparisons of the road are nearly all in favor of the men, and it is very probable that that road is behind the scheme. If the road is built from Albia to North Platte, a gap of forty miles would remain to connect the new road with Norfolk, and give direct connection with Sioux City. That would put Sioux City as near North Platte as Omaha is, and the new road would go through a country that is not well supplied with railroads.

In a recent issue of the HERALD we noticed the action taken by the Presbyterian General Assembly on the subject of prohibition, as it was reported by the associated press. A gentleman who feels the church was not fairly reported on that matter, asks that we publish the following in regard to it, which is from the official report of the proceedings as given by the Presbyterian Banner, and which gives it a different appearance.

Rev. Dr. Thompson moved that the action of the Assembly of 1883, which is as follows, be added to the report on this reference: "That we earnestly recommend to the ministers and congregations, and to all others, to persevere in vigorous efforts until laws shall be enacted in every State and territory of our beloved country prohibiting entirely a traffic which is the principal cause of drunkenness, its consequent pauperism, crime, taxation, laceration, woe and ruin to the homes of men, with which the country has been so long afflicted."

Adopted by a vote of 138 to 82. Dr. Crosby gave notice that he and those who agree with him will enter a protest against this action of the Assembly, which he declared to be political.

When the minutes were read the next day, the following action was taken:

As soon as the minutes were read Rev. Dr. Howard Crosby obtained the floor and offered the following resolution:

Resolved, That the deliberations of the subject of prohibition are not to be entrusted to the advocacy of any political party.

As soon as Dr. Crosby read his resolution, Rev. Dr. C. L. Thompson rose and said he seconded it heartily. In a few words Dr. Crosby then declared that he was unwilling to have the protest of which he gave notice last night go upon the minutes and thus mar the unanimity of the Assembly's action. The Commissioners were, he believed, all animated by right motives, and anxious to do what was right.

The question was then put on the resolution. It was adopted unanimously.

Wakefield Republican—There seems to be a big hurry up over on the new road at lively rate. The teams employed to haul timber from the country to the mill and bridges were compelled under threat of dismissal from the job, to work all day Sunday last. The bridges are put in as fast as men can do the work.

Wagon Chronicle—It has been known out that the chemist who examined the contents of the stomach of Maggie Kendall has reported the find-

ing ofstrychnine in considerable quantities. This verifies the correctness of Dr. Pritchard's diagnosis.

Tekamah-Burlington—Lyons now has the champion wolf hunter in the person of Lewis High, who has killed sixty-six wolves during the past three weeks. Twenty of them were killed in Burlington county, and the remainder in Cedar county. The state bounty is \$1 per head and the county bounty \$3.

Marioning Herald—There seems to be much complaint and justly too, by our farmers and stockmen against the vast herds of cattle that are being grazed upon our prairies to the exclusion of resident stockmen. It is hardly right for outside persons to be allowed such privileges.
