Elmer City is going to have a corn sale again this year, and it is to be a bigger one, and a handsomer one and more expensive one than ever.

The enterprising city of Kearney is going down its pockets for two hundred and fifty thousand dollars to secure the location of a big cotton factory.

Chadron gathered seven car loads of provisions, valued at five thousand dollars, for the Johnston sufferers. Considering the size of the donation that is the biggest donation made by any town in the country.

The national banks of Philadelphia advanced a million dollars to Governor Beaver, without security of interest, to be used in placing Johnston in a good sanitary condition. It is expected that the legislature will repay the money at its next session.

The Sioux commission were successful in securing the necessary names at the Rosebud agency, but at the Pine Ridge they are meeting with a great deal of opposition. This opposition is led by Red Cloud who is supposed to be inspired by Dr. Bland's former Indian agent, and a society in the east that has set up as a sort of Indian protectorate.

Madison Reporter—The assessment returned by the assessors of Madison county will fall short of last year's assessment two hundred thousand and eighty dollars. There is only one reason for this, that is property must have been assessed at an extremely low figure. Next year, however, property will be assessed at its full value without any excuse.

The appearance of a committee from the Alliance before the board of equalization to ask for an investigation of the returns to the assessors caused quite a commotion last week, and there was some unnecessary feeling about it. No one should complain of such action. One of two things is certain; a man has made a proper return, or he has not. If he has made a truthful return of his property he should be willing to make a showing when called on and thus relieve himself of suspicion. If he has not made a true report, he has no right to complain. There is undoubtedly much property that escapes its fair share of taxation, but the amount is much smaller than is generally believed. It is impossible to so adjust taxes that all property will pay its exact share, but no one has reason to fear that the board will mislead him. Threats that complaint will be entered before the board against the assessment of wild and imprudent lands at the same rate should not be carried out. That would simply be injuring the farmers and others in the county availing themselves of the benefit of the improvements.

It is said that the freight rate from Pilger to Omaha is so much less on stock that buyers there can pay less cents more for hogs than Wayne buyers, and they are getting hogs that should be shipped from Wayne. If this is true, and there seems to be no reason to doubt it, the "Omaha" should place us on an equality with such places as Pilger, and do it at once. The difference in distance is small, and does not justify such a discrimination. The rate from Pilger to Omaha is the same as the rate from Wayne to Storm City, shorter distance. If the Sioux City market was as good as that at Omaha the Omaha rate would not make so much difference, but it is not. And Wayne has a right to insist on as good a rate as neighboring towns.

A reference to the commissioners' proceedings will disclose the fact that it costs a pretty good sum to take the assessment of Wayne county.
