This is a common practice all over the country, but the hard-headed old farmers in Wayne are determined to test the treasurer's right to do this. The office is expected to be resigned with half a million of dollars made by speculating with the county funds. The case has once been thrown out of court on the decision of the justice, but the county intend to make the fight on the ground that the treasurer is not only the custodian but also the trustee of the county funds, and the supreme court will doubtless hang its decision on that point."

All of which shows that the World-Herald knows precisely little of what it is talking about. It would perhaps get a different idea of the matter if it knew that ninety-nine out of a hundred of the farmers in the county disapproved of the bringing of the suit, that they have all the while been and are now in favor of its dismissal before the county becomes liable for a big bill of costs, and that they neither expect nor wish that the county shall remove a cent by the proceedings.

The articles that have lately appeared under this heading were written, while the season is so far advanced, that it would be almost impossible to write from memory, assisted by notes, the many incidents that have occurred since the first of the month.
