ALL ARE RULED BY MAN

Great Trainer says: How they teach Durio. Animals are ruled by man. In his memory. Hogs are highly intelligent. Animals vary in disposition as well as man.

Charley White, the veteran animal trainer, while the lion's cage at the tender of fifteen, had handled the king of beasts as if it were a tame kitten. For forty-five years he has done nothing else but train animals for the circus. His right shoulder is shrunken on account of an attempt by a big African lion to make an early breakfast of him. He has a theory that any animal can be trained, if more or less time is expended in the work. Some animals are ruled by fear and some by affection.

Some are trained a laughing hound, but it was a dangerous undertaking. The purpose of these benefits is necessarily limited but the result is not worth the trouble it gives. But of all contrary and the most cunning animals, the zebra leads the provender. The male is wise and docile compared to the female. I can teach a male and obtain a perfect obedience over it, but the zebra has an indomitable spirit that is in open revolt all the time. It would rather die than submit to a harness. TEACHING THE ZEBRA. I have had the looking lions and tigers that could not be taught a single trick. They could learn, for I was not in them. Then I have selected a zebra, a steady-eyed, fierce looking lion and taught him without any trouble. I have long held that no species of animal is harder to teach than man.

Now the goal is obstreperous and seemingly hard to teach, but constant practice will make him a fine performer. Goals have excellent ideas of how to do a thing when once taught. Often they seem to have their heads so far from the matter that they are unable to remember the lesson. I have seen a well educated goat will seldom forget his part. For instance, the moment I stop over, as if we were getting ready for some one to jump on top of his back over me, the goat knows that he has to jump on my back and he does not hesitate to do it. When I begin to stand up the animal knows that he is required to climb upon my head, and it is not long before he is doing so. When I begin to lower my head that is when he knows that he is required to come down and stand on the tip of my cranium.
