Veterans from All Sections Pouring in at Milwaukee.

FIFTY THOUSAND STRAGGLERS

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RAMBLING NOTES

The change in the dusty plains of Idaho to the Blue Mountains of eastern Oregon was a very pleasant one.

There was no dust in the air, which was cool and bracing, and a luxuriant growth of pines, red cedars, blue and gray pines, and the mountain blue grass.

The mountains do not have the boldness and grandeur of the Rockies, but they are more beautiful, sloping away in great curves, which are pure lines to the eye.

Beautiful valleys opened in every direction, and the whole country resembled a great natural park. We passed dozens of deserted logging camps where the larger timber had been cut and the loggers had moved farther back into the mountains.

There were numerous camps of parties who were taking a summer vacation fishing and hunting. You could find plenty of deer and bear in the mountains if you will stop here a few days.

A resident of the country who got on at one of the small stations, but none of us had lost any of our baggage, and at a short distance beyond the mountains is Pendleton, a well built, thrifty looking town of four thousand people.

It is in the midst of an agricultural district, and the country does not present a very attractive appearance. I overheard two eastern farmers giving a very decided opinion that the country was worthless, but a poor country would not support such a place as Pendleton, and the country was evidently much better than it looked to the Illinois men.

Not far beyond Pendleton the emigration trail branched again, and after another dusty ride we reached the banks of the Columbia at Umatilla. Those who read Mr. Slater's letter from that place last winter will remember the description of the country to remain there over night. A sight of the village is all that is necessary to convince one that he had good reason to feel disgusted, for a more desolate, dreary collection of shanties I hope never to see.

That's an ornery looking town, said a man on the platform, and the description just fitted it. The first sight of the Columbia, at Umatilla, is a great disappointment. The descriptions one sees have so much to say about the lovely Columbia, and the majestic Columbia, and all the other kind of glowing, that he gets an idea that the Columbia is nowhere tame or uninteresting, but that is not by any means true.

The writers who first described the river saw only the lower portion, but the descriptions all they have based on the river itself is attractive enough in the upper portion, but its surroundings are anything but attractive. If the prices of real estate that were given were correct, it is what would be thought ridiculously cheap in a Nebraska city of the same size and prospects.

From The Dalles I got in a first view of Mt. Hood, thirty miles distant. The view had already set in the valley, and through the slight haze the snow-crowned peak looked like a great white and pink cone floating in the air.

It proved to be the only satisfactory view of it we got while we were on the coast, as the air was generally filled with smoke from the burning woods and everything at a distance was lost in the haze. A gentleman standing near me expressed his feelings in poetic phrases, and I could not but be contented myself with subscribing to his remarks, "them's my sentiments."

If the ride by rail along the middle portion of the river is to be remembered for its discomfort, that from The Dalles to Portland is one to remember. A life time from the beautiful panoramas of woods, river and mountains. The guide books have a good deal to say of the "wild" river, but there is nothing very significant about them.

They are simply good specimens of the ordinary river steamer, offended by obnoxious and unpleasant passengers. The river is a wonderful beauty compared with the Missouri or the lower Mississippi. The water changes from blue to green, and is beautifully clear. My previous idea of the Columbia was that it was a rapid stream, but in reality, it flows slowly between the great hills that rise in many places two or three thousand feet almost sheer from the water's edge.

A large number of passengers on board the steamer were familiar with the scenery along the Rhine and the Hudson, and they pronounced the Columbia scenery much grander and more beautiful. At the time the government is constructing a canal around the rapids, but a portage of six miles by a narrow gauge railway is yet necessary. There is quite a wide bottom here on the river, and the water is very shallow.

We had an hour to wait for the boat from below, and used a part of the time examining a fish wheel. These fish wheels are a peculiar feature of the scenery along the Columbia. The large ones are built into a framework in the water near the bank, and are stationary. Smaller ones are on rafts, and taken to any point desired.

One I examined was as large as any I saw, and was fifty or sixty feet in diameter. It was made of a double wheel, the sides being ten or twelve feet apart. The sides were covered with a strong wire netting, and the interior was divided into six compartments by vertical partitions from the circumference to the center. The wheels are built at a place where the fish run thick and fast, and are turned by the current. The fish are driven into the wheel, are carried up and their scales are taken, and the fish are then sent to the mill.

Some of the fish are taken with nets, and some are taken by means of traps. One would imagine they are certain to be exterminated, but the lower river is immensely broad, and deep, and the feeding grounds of vast numbers of salmon fishing will be an important industry in the Columbia for many years yet.

One of the most interesting features of the scenery along the Columbia is the wide spread on the side of the mountain among dense pine and fir. While the pine is seen to be watered and irrigated from the side of the mountain nearly a thousand feet. I supposed it was one of the unexplained beauties of the country and admired it all my night, until a gentleman at my elbow said "McIntosh Falls." The dance in the hall Friday night was a success in every respect. Every one seemed to enjoy himself so much that another was announced for two

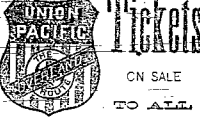
weeks, and we hope to see a very good attendance, feeling that you will not regret coming.
