**GROFF SELECTED.**  
The Nebraska Judge Named  
for Land Commissioner.

**MAJ. WARNER DECLINES OFFICE.**  
The Ex-Commander-in-Chief of the  
Grand Army Said to Have Declined the  
Shop of Commissioner Tanner -  
The Armes Case.

**DEER PARK, Md., Sept. 17.** - Lewis  
A. Groff, of Omaha, Neb., was appointed  
commissioner of the general  
land office, vice S. W. Steele-  
blager, resigned.  
Judge Lewis A. Groff was born at  
Coaster O., December 31, 1814. He  
was educated in his native county, and  
in 1868 commenced reading law in  
Napoleon, Ohio. In 1867 he was ad-  
mitted to the bar and immediately  
afterward commenced practice in the  
city of Toledo. He at once became a  
prominent figure in politics and continued  
as such until 1870, when he re-  
moved to Toledo, Ohio, and thereafter  
in the practice of his profession. In  
1872 he became associated with J. H.  
Armes, a partnership which was con-  
tinued until 1874, when he removed to  
St. Louis. He returned to Nebraska and  
remained in Omaha, where he practiced  
law until 1877, when he came to Omaha,  
where he has since resided. Judge  
Groff was elected district judge for  
the non-partisan district and has since  
attended to nearly all the criminal busi-  
ness in the district.

**An Operator Held for Negligence.**  
WASHINGTON, Sept. 17. - The coroner's  
jury investigating the causes which led  
to the collision near the navy yard turn-  
out on the Baltimore and Annapolis rail-  
road last Friday night, and which re-  
sulted in the death of engineer Jamieson,  
found a verdict against the operator, and  
the collision and Jamieson's death were  
due to the negligence of E. H. Kramer,  
the telegraph operator. It seems from  
the evidence taken, received  
an order to hold all north-bound trains,  
but mistakenly allowed a north-bound  
train to go ahead and collide with the  
south-bound express train, which was  
a wreck on the north track was  
rushing 1400 feet under special  
orders on the south track. Kramer was  
held for the action of the grand jury.

**Beaver's Assailant.**

was fully prepared for the ordeal and  
had invited a physician and some  
friends to be present at the inquiry.  
He was to be here a few miles out  
in the country, before the order was is-  
sued. Notice of the suspension of the  
order was sent to him later.

**A Credence on the Gulf.**  
WASHINGTON, Sept. 17. - The follow-

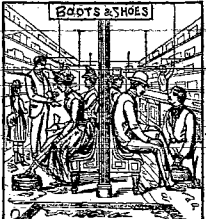
