DOUGLASS' NIGHTMARE

It Was the Wild Freak of a Writer's Imagination.

THE DEMOCRATIC CLANS GATHER.

Bill's Followers Will Nominate Their Ticket at Syracuse—The Socialists in Convention at Chicago—Wyoming's Constitution Signed.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 1.—The report that Commander Kellogg was relieved from the command of the Osagee at his own request, because Minister Frederick Douglass and party were to proceed to Haiti on her, and that "Commander Kellogg" who succeeded him, reported the vessel's boilers-in bad condition to prevent the voyage, is again denied by Secretary Tracy, who made public all the correspondence relating to the matter. It is shown from the letters and telegrams that Commander Kellogg was relieved from the command of the Osagee Sept. 21, three days before it was known that Minister Douglass would proceed to Haiti on her. The correspondence also shows that it was not Commander Kellogg, but Chief Engineer Robie, of the Norfolk navy yard, who reported the vessel's boilers in bad condition. It is further stated that the Osagee was in condition to proceed to Haiti and Robie took no special action. The correspondence is quite ample on this point, which was denied by Secretary Tracy, who appointed Chief Engineer Robie to the vessel. Mr. Tracy also denies the published statement to the effect that Commander Kellogg was relieved from the command of the Osagee as a result of an unpleasant personal interview at the department. Kellogg was asked to be relieved from active sea duty simply because he had been on sea duty nearly four years as commander and desired to be placed on shore duty.

The New York Democrats.

SYRACUSE, N. Y., Oct. 30.—The Democratic state convention bids fair to be as harmonious as was the Saratoga convention of last week. The delegates are all here and the city presents a lively appearance. The state committee has heard the arguments of contestants and the indications point to harmonious action in convention. There does not appear any danger that the ticket will be nominated, viz. For secretary of state, Frank R. Brough, R. T. Johnson, of the court of appeals, Dennis O'Brien, and the nomination of State Engineer Bogart and Comptroller Wernicke. A hard fight is being waged by local Democratic Republicans in behalf of William Beach for the state treasury, but the leaders say nothing can defeat Danforth for the office. As for the ticket, it may be said to be cut and dried. As a prominent leader put it: "We are going to show Mr. Platts that we are as united and as solid as was his convention."

It was a curious sight to see Gen. Charles F. Smith, representing the delegates in Leland in behalf of Beach. For a time the scene in the hotel lobby resembled that witnessed at conventions of the opposite party, so numerous were his followers among the Turnament and County Democrats.

The Socialists.

CHICAGO, Oct. 1.—The delegates to the convention of the Socialist labor party, now in session at Turner hall, were busy in preparing a platform, which was not finished. In the morning, while in executive session, W. J. Reynolds, the general secretary of the party, read a report reviewing the trouble between the New York factory workers and the United Labor of the Socialists from the United Labor convention at Syracuse, and culled several weeks to the assistance of Roosevelt, Gerreke, Hazle and Sauter, and their party at the headquarters of the party at 20 East Fourth street. Those four claim they were illegally and unconstitutionally expelled and maintain that they will now the national executive of the party. The convention now in session at Turner hall, under the auspices of the suspended members, and it is probable that another convention will be held in the city on October 12 by Smith and his friends. Rosenberg in his report charges that Smith and Daniel are crooked and sold out the Progressive labor party to the Republicans during the last national campaign. The report was referred to a special committee.

Wyoming's Constitution Signed.

CHEYENNE, Wyo., Oct. 30.—The members of the constitutional convention signed the instrument and adjourned subject to the call of the president. Nov. 1 is announced day—in an address the people are urged to turn out and make a good showing of population.
