UTAH'S GOVERNOR MAKES REPORT. The Peculiar Birth of the Dakotas; Leaving the Age of the Twain in Mystery—How One Remains in the History to Arlington.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 6.—"They have accepted the doctrine of polygamy, and will probably adhere to it as long as they live," says Governor Arthur Thomas of Utah in his annual report to the secretary of the Interior, referring to the attitude of the people of the territory, and it is but a very poor tribute to their honesty to say they have abandoned it. His conditions to say that they had adopted this in their leading characteristics, and as a rule they are law-abiding, except as to their peculiar belief. Their ranks are filled up from the lower classes of Europe and the mountain countries, where the average rate of intelligence is the lowest. Of political and official merit, they are very poor. "I can only say that I am not a believer in polygamy," says the governor. Why? Primarily because anti-prohibition republicans largely availed themselves of the opportunity as the most timely that had arisen to record their dissent from prohibition as a policy for dealing with the drink evil. This opportunity was regarded as favorable in view of the local character or the election—its comparative freedom from entanglement with national politics. The democratic candidate for the governorship had left the republican party because of his hostility to prohibition. These republicans were in sympathy with him on that question. The republican candidate was pronounced in his support of prohibition. They voted the democratic ticket on this question.

The result disproves the declaration in the recent platform that prohibition is the settled policy of the state.
