The men who named one of the new western counties in this state 'Banner,' knew exactly what they were doing. At the last election Banner county gave the republican ticket 800 votes, and not a democrat vote was cast in the county. The prohibition ticket got nine votes.

If they follow it up by doing what is necessary to secure the proposed new railroad bridge and give the eastern railroad easy access to the city they will create a more general confidence in the future. Omaha has been depending almost entirely on her natural advantages. It is gratifying to see her exhibit a little push.

The Free-American Congress. Washington, Dec. 3.—The Free-American congress, combined session of the rules to govern their proceedings up to the hour of adjournment. 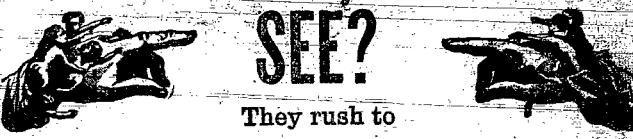

We enclose the following from a romantic tale published in a New York paper. The writer probably had a certain amount of space to fill, and was going to do it without regard to consequences. We suspect that he had met Atlas Hart, of the Dakota City Eagle, somewhere, and heard some of his reservation yarns. As the scene is laid so near our readers will doubtless be interested in it.

Thurston county, Nebraska, is doubtless entitled to the distinction of being the home of a more mysterious character than any other county in the west that are daily chronicled in the press throughout the world. He lives in a hole in the ground about five miles east of town, and he has never been known to do a day's work, always dresses in the height of fashion, and never runs in debt. Accompanied by Howling Wolf, an Omaha Indian who has passed and repassed the dismal spot thousands of times in the last five years, I visited this strange character the other day. Go-jug-meles cast of Ponder we left the main traveled road leading to the Omaha Agency and turning to the north drove perhaps three-quarters of a mile down a rocky or ravine. Here Howling Wolf stopped the team and beckoned me to alight. I asked him what he was going to do, as there was nothing to indicate that we were within a mile of the abode of a mortal man. He pointed to the ground a few feet ahead of the team, and upon closely scrutinizing the earth, at the point to which my attention had been directed by my Indian friend, I saw a hole in the ground about 2 feet square. Bidding Howling Wolf take care of our team, I stepped to the spot and tapped a couple of times with the butt of my whip on what soon proved to be a door leading to the habitation of a man who, in every sense of the word, a mystery. The promptness with which my summons was answered almost startled me. I had scarcely drawn my whip from the door after tapping the second time when up came the door and two large gray eyes peered up at me from the strange cave below. "Hello, there," he said, as he beckoned me to come down with his right hand, in which he held a dim light. I followed him down a ladder into a narrow passage-way, which led to a door about eight feet from the entrance. Opening the door, which was made of rough timber, he bade me "step right in air." I did as directed, and he followed, closing the door behind him. Before I had any time to offer any excuse or reason for my presence I was very politely invited to take a seat and make myself at home, when the gentleman of the decidedly queer abode struck out in a lightning rate of conversation as follows: "Colonel, I am so glad to see you that I could content myself agay down in the ground, out of sight of everybody but I tell you I am happier right here with my pees, (meaning a couple of badgers that were kept in a box in one corner) than I could possibly be anywhere else on earth."

I acknowledged my surprise at this declaration, and asked him if he had any particular objection to giving me some explanation as to his extremely odd and unusual preference.

The story then goes on to relate at length that the hermit in his younger days had lived in Indiana, and was engaged to be married to a young lady in Minnesota. When he had at length saved enough money to get married and bring home his bride, the day for the wedding was fixed. The night before he was to start he engaged in a spree with his old companions, and spent every dollar he had saved. He wrote to his intended that he had lost his money and that that the wedding must be postponed for a few months. Before he could again save the necessary money the young lady to whom he was engaged lost her life in an Indian massacre. The hero of the story then restlessly wandered from place to place all over the country. He inherited a considerable fortune which he invested in bonds, living on the income from them. After living as a hermit in Wisconsin for ten years his health failed, and in 1888 he had removed to the Omaha reservation, and expected to end his days there.

Mr. Ebes is six feet tall and wears a full dark beard. His forehead, which is fair as that of a woman, projects out over his eyes to a noticeable degree. He is a ready and very easy talker, using good language, and the only opinion one can form of him after visiting his lonely place is that he is voluntarily punishing himself for folly indulged in during his youth by imprisoning himself in the dismal dirt den that he today calls home.

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
