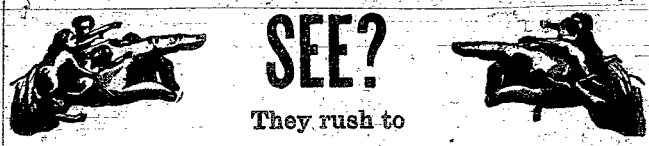

The appointment of Judge Brewer of Kansas, to the vacancy on the supreme bench, is as satisfactory to the people of the west as any that could have been made.

The Chicago auditorium, the largest and finest operative structure in the world, was formally dedicated Monday night in the presence of the president and a large number of noted men. Patti was the chief attraction.

The cashier of the sergeant at arms of the house of representative left Washington the other day with some seventy thousand dollars that did not belong to him. Nearly all the members of the house have received their monthly salary or money to his satisfaction.

The Sioux City corn palace association is getting into hot water over a big deficiency that is the only thing remaining from the big fair. Sioux City people kick just as vigorously as common folks when they are called on to pay for a dead horse.

Governor Mellette makes the official announcement that several counties in South Dakota must receive aid to keep the people from starvation. In minor county alone six hundred families are almost utterly destitute and depend on charity to carry them through the winter.

"If Omaha does not move on Dakota," says the "Dakota," "what's just the trouble. Omaha waits for some other place to do the moving. It would be better if Omaha would get a move on" herself.

The location of the state fair for next five years will be decided on the annual meeting of the association next month. Omaha wants the fair, but in this matter money talks, and Omaha is not much inclined to do her talking that way. Omaha will not get the fair.

It is reported that the Nebraska delegation will urge the appointment of Dundy to the position made vacant by the promotion of Judge Brewer to the supreme bench. It is well enough to push a Nebraska man when he is fit for such a position, but Dundy is one of the worst old grandmothers on the bench. He compares with Judge Shires, of Iowa, also a candidate for the place, as a tallow dip in a electrio light.

A considerable number of the soldiers on the reservation, near Pender, were greatly surprised to find their lands were advertised for sale by the government, presumably for some failure to comply with the regulations of the land office. They had, or at least supposed they had, done everything that was necessary to secure the land, and all held receipts from the land office at Neligh. The settlers think they will come out all right, but they will have a great deal of trouble in rectifying some one's blunder.

NEW ORLEANS, Dec. 10.—The number of people pressing into the city failed to give the body of Jefferson Davis was not diminished by the rainy weather. Many strangers are arriving in the city to join the ranks of the mourners. The city officials say that under the peculiar circumstances of the case, Secretary Proctor's reply to Mayor Shakespeare's announcement of Mr. Davis' death was very graceful and gave evidence of a kindly spirit.

The Confederates are very much pleased with the fraternal spirit which characterized the remarks of Capt. Jacob Gray, of the Grand Army of the Republic, made before the executive committee last Saturday night. Capt. Gray stated that he would be proud as a soldier of the United States to honor the memory of the illustrious patriot, soldier and statesman of the South. He said that he had been a soldier of the United States who had rendered distinguished service or failed to recognize that he was a great American. Jefferson Davis should, as a gallant soldier, be accorded as a burial with every show of the profound respect and love of the people. "If it is agreed," he said, "that the body of the dead chieftain shall be borne into the cemetery upon the shoulders of the Grand Army of the Republic, shall certainly demand to have his right to rest in the performance of that sad and honorable duty."

It is learned that all the army officers, while they cannot take any official action in regard to the death of Mr. Davis, have great respect for him as a soldier and a statesman and will attend the funeral. A meeting of southern editors has been called here for Wednesday in order to settle upon plans for furthering the movement of a monument to the deceased. A fund for Mrs. Davis.

In response to a telegram from Gen. Gordon, at the head of Confederate veterans, Governor Gordon has appointed a committee to take charge of the fund to be raised for Mrs. Davis and her daughter. By midnight it is calculated 100,000 people have passed the line. Among those who came were the former pupils of the high schools, and many Catholic priests and other dignitaries. The floral offerings were many and beautiful. A handsome floral arrangement was sent anonymously by a British sailor.

ATLANTA, Ga., Dec. 10.—Governor Fowle of North Carolina and party, returned to the city on the way to New Orleans. Governor Gordon will leave to-day, escorted by the Gate City Guard. The work of raising funds for the relief of Mrs. Davis was begun. Subscribers are coming in from every body—veteran Union soldiers as well as Confederate contributors. The total now exceeds about \$5,000. The Jefferson Davis Memorial association has applied for a charter. It is intended to make this state headquarters for a monument to be located here.

NEW ORLEANS, Dec. 10.—At a meeting of the Board of Trade resolutions of respect for the memory of Jefferson Davis were passed, and it was adopted that they shall be closed on Wednesday, that the flag shall be placed at half mast, and that the city streets and rooms be draped in mourning for thirty days. Jacksonville Schools Closed.

MADISON, Wis., Dec. 10.—The public schools of Jacksonville will close on Wednesday in respect to the memory of Jefferson Davis. Governor Fleming and a large party from this city and the Nebraska will attend the funeral here.
