There is a report from Sioux City to the effect that the Rock Island will build to Sioux City to connect with the Short Line.

The Cronin case is ended at last, and vice of the accused Campbell, O'Bullivan and Burns go to the penitentiary for life. Kuzko gets three years in the penitentiary and Beggs goes free.

A cold blooded murder occurred at Covington Saturday morning. The victim E. B. Erwin, was a son of one of the most prominent business men of Sioux City. Erwin has been wild and wreckless for a number of years and has been consorting with the tough characters for whom Covington has become notorious. He was in a saloon at Covington Saturday night and early Sunday morning and had been quarrelling with James Toohy, whom he knocked down. After the trouble had quieted down Toohy secured a long carving knife which he secreted in his sleeve. Waiting a favorable opportunity he walked past Erwin and plunged the long knife into his throat severing the jugular vein, and killing him almost instantly.

Two important criminal cases from other counties were tried at the terms of court just closed, and in both of them the counties to which they belonged will have a heavy bill of costs to pay. Neither case should have been pushed on such evidence as was introduced. The county attorney in both Madison and Thurston counties knew, or should have known that the evidence was insufficient to sustain charges made in the indictments, and to make such a bill of costs to no purpose, was to say the least, unfortunate. Mr. Mapes is probably excusable on account of the state of public opinion in Madison county, which almost compelled him to take the course he did, but we believe his own judgment would have deemed a dismissal long before trial. The bringing of the Indiana case was utterly inadvisable. The evidence was so shadowy and indefinite that it needed no man experienced in the courts to know that no conviction could ever come from such testimony. And this without any regard to the question of the guilt or innocence of the defendant in either of the cases mentioned. Public feeling may be again an excuse for this; there may be a general conviction that he is guilty, a county attorney may himself most firmly believe in his guilt yet it he can not find sufficient legal evidence to sustain an action in the courts he is not justified in bringing the case on trial. It is folly for a prosecuting attorney to carry on an expensive suit and cover himself with confusion to satisfy the clamor of a faction. He will in the end stand better in the opinion of the public if he has the backbone to refuse to prosecute a case that is bound to fail. He is in the place of legal adviser to the public; should no more consent to prosecute a weak criminal case than he would a weak civil case. The change from district attorney to county attorneys has not proved a complete success. It is more expensive than the district attorney system and as a rule gets the counties less experienced and able attorneys. There ought to be a vigorous attempt to change to the old system when the next legislature meets.

COMMISSIONER'S PROCEEDINGS. December 10 1886. Board of Commissioners met pursuant to adjournment all members present. Minutes of last meeting was read and approved. Henson et al reported favorably and road ordered. On the application of Warner Starr Assessor of the same was granted. Contract the same was granted until the next meeting of the board. The county attorney is hereby authorized to take after the interest of the County in the Road cases now pending in the District Court of Wayne County Neb. Board adjourned to first Tuesday of January 1887. Wm. H. H. Clerk. (Assent)

Chicago Tribune. In an interview with a Tribune reporter Senator Wilson, of Iowa, said: "We will with the republican party of Iowa do about prohibition? It will stand by it. The people of Iowa believe in parties keeping good faith as well as men. The republican party would break faith if it repealed the prohibition law. I would not belong to a party that would so break faith. I do not believe the prohibition law will be repealed. It will stand by it. The republican party of the senate to do it. The senate has a republican majority, and I don't believe it will change that law. Prohibition in Iowa is a success. I will admit there are some places where it is not enforced. But in the greater part of the state it is enforced, and the majority of the people favor it." "Senator Wilson must have misapprehended either the question asked him or what is proposed for Iowa. The repeal of the prohibition law is not suggested by republicans, and the law as it stands will doubtless remain the rule in eight-tenths or more of the counties which are rural and contain no large towns. Prohibition is to remain wherever the people desire it and will enforce it. It is proposed only to modify the law so that in the counties with large cities, where prohibition has never been enforced, the saloons shall be brought under the control of restrictive taxation. It cannot be any breach of faith on the part of the republican party to give the state as a whole the greatest possible restriction of the liquor traffic total prohibition wherever it is wanted by the people, and high taxation, plant the best thing, where it is not wanted. The counties which desire prohibition are not to be affected in any way or deprived of the means of excluding the saloons. The sole question is as to those counties with cities where prohibition has never been enforced and is not now enforced, and to all appearances never can be without military rule. Shall the people therein be permitted to impose high taxation on the saloons which vend liquor? Is the traffic to be free in these counties or is it to be subjected to restrictive taxation and regulation? Can temperance be better promoted by having prohibition in any, eighty rural counties, and wide open liquor traffic in twenty out-lying ones; or to have prohibition in eighty dry counties and heavy restrictive taxation on the saloons in the twenty out-lying counties? We there are any breach of faith or violation of common sense in adopting the latter alternative?"

Kekukuk Gate City. Francis Murphy has single handed and alone done more to keep other men from becoming drunkards by personal practical work than all other temperance people in Iowa put together. He is a member of the Temperance Society of Creston and the Council Bluffs Nonpartisan League. "Prohibition is now and always will be a failure, and that the greatest triumph the temperance cause ever had in Pennsylvania was the day prohibition was so completely and forever buried out of sight." Whether he said that or not he is known to be strongly and unreservedly opposed to prohibition. It seems that a man's opinion who has done so much practically to save men from the drink habit as Francis Murphy has, ought to have some weight with other good men and women.

The triangular combination said to be formed between Dorsey, Richards and Melickjohn to continue one of them in congress, make another governor and the third attorney general is too foolish to talk about. No one knows better than L. D. Richards that such a tip up would kill him too dead to skin, and Melickjohn well understands that his political prospects do not hinge on the present congressmen from the Third district. If there is in the Third district a man of excellent means and whose promise to hold his tongue, even that young man in Melickjohn, and for him to attach himself to the old bulk that will soon be everlastingly stranded, so shrewd a man will never perpetrate.
