Senator Voorhes Promises to Suggest Relief Measures.

A VERY BUSY DAY IN THE HOUSE.

The Republicans Agree to Cut the Duty on Raw Sugar Over 30 Per Cent.

WASHINGTON, March 15.—Several petitions remonstrating against the ratification of an extradition treaty between the United States and Russia were presented in the senate and gave rise to quite an animated discussion about the propriety of receiving petitions in open session in regard to matters which might be pending in executive session. It was finally decided by vote, receiving the petitions in opposition. The speakers carefully refrained from committing themselves to any statement as to which treaty being pending.

Mr. Voorhes offered a preamble and resolution reciting the great depression in industry which agricultural interests are suffering from, and reciting that the highest duty of congress in the present crisis is to lay aside all discussion and consideration of non-party issues and to take prompt and immediate action to the preparation and adoption of legislation in relief of those who are suffering under the depression.

Senators Eustis and Dunlap were appointed members of the committee on agriculture, in place of Messrs. Gorman and Call, excused.

Mr. Voorhes offered the granting of the right of way to the Kansas City and Pacific railroad through Indian territory was passed by the committee on appropriations.

The urgent deficiency bill was taken up and a number of amendments are reported by the committee on appropriations were agreed to among them one appropriating \$50,000 for additional equipment of the international maritime conference, one \$50,000 for continuing the publication of the section records and \$200,000 for public printing. The senate then, at 5:30 p. m., adjourned.

DUTY ON RAW SUGAR.

The Republicans Agree Upon a Cut of More Than 50 Per Cent.

WASHINGTON, March 18.—The Republican members of the ways and means committee agreed to put raw sugar from 10 Dutch standard (100 to the cask) at 35 per cent. of valuations, and refined sugar 40 per cent. above 10 Dutch standard. This is equivalent to 50 per cent. reduction on many grades and more than 50 per cent. on other grades. The reduction on many average a cut of 50 per cent. on the present rates and will reduce the revenue from \$25,000,000 to \$25,000,000 there is no bounty provided. This cut is more than two and a half times greater than that proposed by the Miller bill. The duty is to be collected upon the value and upon specific rates as hereafter. It will be levied that only 5 per cent. additional duty is given to the importer with the admission of the low grade of sugar up to the including No. 15 Dutch standard, the two last grades being made into sugar, and being fit for domestic uses, will, it is hoped, take away from the refiners the power to raise the price and to the customer at will. This heavy reduction is regarded by the Republican members as a most generous concession to the western sentiment among Republicans. It is lower than the senate rate fixed by the bill which passed that body last August, and is free from that which was so exceptional in the senate bill, a bounty clause. The senate bill made a reduction of 50 per cent. and gave a bounty of one cent per pound. The action of the Republican members of the committee makes a cut of 50 per cent. more than 50 per cent. and eliminates from its provisions the experiment of paying a bonus to one class of producers directly from the public treasury.

Senate Bills.

WASHINGTON, March 18.—Among the bills introduced in the senate were the following:—By Mr. Brewster, to increase preference to veterans of the late war employment on public works (this bill provides that Union soldiers, sailors and marines shall be given preference for certification, appointment, employment and retention in every public department and on all public works of the government, and in competitive and non-competitive examinations of all civil service, age, loss of limbs or other physical impairment which does not incapacitate, shall not disqualify the applicant, provided he possesses the necessary business capacity. Such persons, unless employed for statutory term, shall not be dismissed except on charges and after a hearing.) Violation of the law by heads of departments, officials, boards of examinations or others to be prosecuted as a misdemeanor.

By Mr. Plumb—To prevent desertions from the army.—This bill provides that after July 1, 1901, there shall be deducted from the pay of each enlisted man \$4 a month for the first year of enlistment, which shall be paid to him until his discharge, and which shall be forfeited unless he serves honorably and faithfully to the day of his discharge. The sums so deducted shall be a deposit bearing interest from the end of the year in which they were made. Enlistments are to continue for five years, but at the end of three years service a soldier who has served honorably shall be entitled to three months' furlough and to be discharged on application, in time of peace.

Adams Opposes the Funding Measure.

WASHINGTON, March 18.—President Adams, of the Union Pacific railroad, before the house committee on the Pacific railroads of Senator Fry's funding bill. If he opposes the bill, which he says, will not be to the advantage of the government or of the United States, he says the framers of the bill have fallen into the error of imposing on a debtor terms more onerous than the debtor can bear.

Tontos Hope for a Revolt.

Tucson, Ariz., March 18.—A special dispatch to The Star-Globe says that for some weeks the Tonto Apaches at Charley Pan's camp on the Rio-Rito, two miles from the agency, have been acting sullenly. On Feb. 15 Isaac Clark Burrows and Industrial Teacher Jerry visited the camp for the purpose of issuing Union tickets to the Indians. The officers noted that the number of Indians present did not tally with the number given as entitled to rations and they demanded that the missing ones be produced. This did not suit the Tontos and some of the bucks got their guns and requested the superintendent to tell Burrows and Jerry that they had better return to the agency, which they did. On Saturday night eight of the Tontos were corralled at San Carlos agency and they will be taken to Fort Union for safe keeping. It is now thought that the Tontos were ripe for a revolt.

The Globe Trotters Off.

POINT TOWNSEND, Wash., March 18.—She begins Hornsby, a young lady of the city started on a trip around the world. She is determined if possible to break all previous records in globe trotting. The citizens subscribed \$3,000 towards defraying the expenses of the trip. She expects to make the trip in 150 days. George Francis Train sailed from Tacoma with similar purpose in view. He proposes to purchase a globe in forty days. Washington will watch the race with a good deal of interest, although all the other states regard it with indifference. Secretary Tries to Party.

WASHINGTON, March 18.—Secretary Tilly and party, who were stranded at Lower Cedar on board the Dispatch Saturday night, were rescued by the United States tug Triton and brought up the Potomac, until they met the fish commission steamer Fish Hawk and Alexandria. The Fish Hawk then took the secretary and friends on board and proceeded to Norfolk.

New York Socialists.

NEW YORK, March 18.—A large meeting of socialists was held at the Cooper middle to commemorate the Paris Commune. S. S. Schweitch and other social leaders spoke, eulogizing the commune and predicting the triumph of Socialism in this and other countries.

The Bennett Law Denounced.

NEW YORK, March 18.—Several League meetings protested against the Bennett law. The Bennett law, they said, was only passed to interfere with private schools and therefore all League voters are called on to support such political candidates as favor repeal of the Bennett law.


