Representative Dorsey went before Secretary Rusk Thursday and asked him to "urge an appropriation of \$100,000 to establish a beet-sugar experiment station in Nebraska. The secretary replied:

"I would not recommend such a proposition, for the reason that the beet-sugar industry is not in its early stages. It is a winner. The fact is the beets raised last year in Nebraska contain a larger per centage of saccharine matter than any raised in any part of the world. We are trying to secure all the beet seed possible to supply the demands upon us. What the people of Nebraska should do now is to organize and establish canneries, as the beets are of Nebraska without reliance.—Fremont Tribune.

The farmers of the northwest for two years have suffered in various localities from drought. But there are some things that are vastly more than such a degree of drought as has been felt in the northwest, and one of them is too much water. Consider the plight of the farmers in the vast inundated region along the lower Mississippi and say whether you would swap good South Dakota land for the same below the flood level of the Mississippi.—Sioux City Journal.

**HOUSEHOLD HINTS.**

To prepare for carpeting a floor which has been plastered with mortar, cast on in one mass, a thin coat, a little at a time, pour it into the cracks of the floor, have some one follow with a knife and a whisk to sweep it into the cracks as neatly as possible. A carpet put down for three years over such a floor will show no signs of moth when taken up.

Wash of equal parts of glycerine and iron filings will remove moth and fleas from the face.

The mending of kid gloves shows far less if done with cotton thread than if done with silk.

Iron and polished steel when not in use, may be kept from rusting by wiping with a cloth on which a little kerosene has been poured.

The Pension Bureau.  
WASHINGTON, March 27.—The speaker laid before the house a letter from the secretary of the interior in reply to the pensioners' petition asking what saving of public expenditure, if any, could be made by transferring the bureau of pensions from the department of the interior to the war department.
