The Union Pacific has established a line of steamers between Oregon and China.

The Australian ballot bill passed the house of the Iowa state legislature, Tuesday.

The bill has passed the house creating two new land districts in Nebraska, one at Alliance and the other at Broken Bow.

We see by most of our exchanges that the World's Fair has been postponed until 1893. It will be interesting to their subscribers. Let's see its only three years.

The appeal of Delliver, of Iowa, before the house April 7th, in favor of pensions, was full of eloquence, and one that will reach to the very depths the hearts of old soldiers.

The working force of the United States is about 23,000,000 persons, 10,000,000 of whom are engaged in agricultural pursuits, employing a capital of \$16,000,000 invested in farms and their equipments.

Five hundred bills have been introduced in the house of the Iowa state legislature, but the bills that will be of most interest to the people of that state, are those of the members which the taxpayers will have to pass upon.

The cry seems to be coming from all quarters urging the government to pay off the bonds so that a larger volume of money will be placed in circulation. It is true that the money men who hold government bonds would not throw their money away in result, but would loan it out on good security, thus bringing into circulation money that is now hoarded away in the treasury vaults.

The dependent pension bill was discussed in the house April 7th, by a vote of 149 to 87, not the necessary two-thirds voting in the affirmative. The struggle - There seems to be a limit to the expenditure of money for public buildings, etc., yet the old soldier (who has given the people freedom, and at what a cost,) must struggle on for a little bread because the expense would be too heavy on the "poor government." It is wrong and must be made right or there will be a revolution in politics that will startle the nation.

Petitions are being circulated to the effect of the county and receiving many signatures, to be presented to the county commissioners requesting them to call a special election for the purpose of submitting a proposition to vote bonds for the erection of a suitable court house for Wayne county. A large number of farmers have signed the petition and many have expressed themselves as in favor of a forty or fifty thousand dollar building. A visit to the present "barn" used for county purposes, is certainly sufficient to disgust any citizen of this county, and we believe that Wayne county will have a court house in the near future.

Already the campaign bonanzas are being, turning this, and trying that way, and are apparently causing the formation of a political cycle that has never had an equal in Nebraska politics. Republicans, levards, adopt those plans and methods which are just, true and honorable and fight stubbornly for victory. A righteous and just cause cannot but ultimately win, and the cause of the laboring man and the farmer, as well as other classes, deserve, and demand your attention in politics, and it is to be hoped that the state central committee will earnestly work to bring about this result. It is certainly republican that every man's rights and privileges be on an equality.

When the southern states were under the domination of republican carpet baggers there was general outcry in the south against their rapacity and dishonesty. The northern carpet bagger has long since given way to the native demagogue; but the same demagogue is more rampant than ever at the southern state capitals. Within less than three years eight southern treasurers have decamped with state funds to the amount of eight, two hundred dollars; Tennessee, four hundred thousand; Alabama, two hundred and forty-three thousand; Kentucky, two hundred and thirty thousand; Mississippi, one hundred and twenty-seven thousand; Missouri, thirty-two thousand; Mississippi, thirty hundred and fifteen thousand; and Maryland, two hundred thousand; a grand total of two million two hundred and forty-five thousand dollars. Is it any wonder that taxes are burdensome in the south? - Omaha Bee.

The Baltimore Sun of April 3rd, came out in a double headed editorial demanding the retirement from politics of Senator Gorman, of Maryland. It states that unless Gorman and his followers are thrown overboard, democracy in that state will be relegated to the rear forever. This means the retirement from Maryland politics one of the most conspicuous democrats in the country, and a strong friend of ex-president Cleveland.

At Elgerton, Kansas, at the late election the women's ticket carried the day, electing mayor, police judge and five councilmen, all women.

EPIDEMIC HEMORRHOID - As there is an epidemic of scarlet fever prevailing in Iowa, and several families quarantined, a few suggestions in regard to it might not be unavailing, and what I have to say is written in no spirit of controversy, but merely in hopes that it will have a tendency to diminish the spread of the disease, and also to put people on their guard as to the results which sometimes follows scarlet fever of even the very mildest type. In regard to the mild type of scarlet fever, and what the leading men in the profession think of it, I wish to quote a few words from Dr. J. Lewis Smith, professor of diseases of children in Bellevue Medical College, New York, which authority with me, no physician will for a moment treat to question. He says: "The type of scarlet fever varies greatly in different epidemics, and frequently also in cases which occur in the same epidemic, even in the same family. One child may have scarlet fever so mild that little treatment is required, and another child of the same mother has the malignant form, and soon succumbs, notwithstanding the prompt employment of the most efficient and appropriate measures." This variation in different cases and different epidemics, is a strikingly unequalled in any other infectious malady. A distinguished physician of this city, who has treated more than fifty cases in one of the most difficult situations, without a single death. A short time afterward, the type of the disease changed and his own son, who was from a mild case, died. In another place he writes as follows: "In the spring of 1888 I was called to see an infant thirteen months old, whose throat was slightly sore, and had an indistinct rash over part of the surface. In two days the rash had disappeared and the health within a day or two later, was apparently fully restored. Diagnosis would have been doubtful except for scarlet fever, which clearly indicated the scarlatinal nature of the attack. In another instance two children passed through the entire course of the disease, and on the very day in the street, the disease not being recognized. Two weeks later one of the children had inflammation of the kidneys and dropsy as a result of the disease terminating in death."

One more question from the same authority and I have done. "Why inflammation of the kidneys with the subsequent dropsy, so frequently occurs in patients who die of scarlet fever, but not in those who recover? It is understood, but the fact has long been observed, that the kidneys do become affected nearly if not altogether as often after mild cases as they do after severe cases."

From the above it will be evident to everyone that there is such a thing as a mild form of scarlet fever, and that frequently there is great danger to the patient from the disease, even when the rules adopted by the board of New York city, in regard to scarlet fever and other contagious diseases: "The patient should be placed in a separate room, and no one except the physician or nurse allowed to enter, or touch the bedding or clothing used in the sick room until they have been thoroughly and carefully disinfected."

All clothing, bedding, or other articles, not absolutely necessary for the use of the patient should be removed from the sick room. Articles used about the patient, such as clean pillow cases, blankets, or clothes must not be removed from the sick room until they have been disinfected by the following method: - One half pound of sulphur, and one ounce of carbolic acid, and three gallons of water. They should be soaked in the fluid for at least an

hour, and then placed in boiling water for washing. - A piece of wet linen, not more than 12 inches wide, and 18 inches long, should be dipped in the fluid, and kept hanging in the sick room constantly, also in the hall adjoining.

All vessels used for receiving the discharge of patients should be cleaned of the same fluid, and immediately after being used should be emptied and cleaned with boiling water. All stove or hot beds should be burned. Do not use handkerchiefs about the patient, but soft rags for cleaning the nostrils and mouth, and thermal cottons should be burned.

The result of a sick room after removal of the patient should be thoroughly cleaned and lime washed, and the woodwork and floors scrubbed with soap and water.

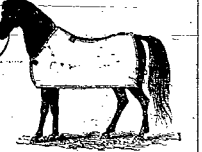
