CONGRESS' DOINGS

Silver--Again Under Discussion in the Senate.

AN INVESTIGATION REQUESTED

By Fish Commissioner McDonald, Who Complains of Newspaper Attacks--The Public Debt Statement--Prepared Part Legislation--Senate Confirmation.

WASHINGTON, June 3.--In the senate a conference was ordered on the naval appropriation bill. The silver bill was taken up and Mr. Morrill addressed the senate. He had been in favor of doubling the amount of silver bullion purchased and had been desirous of doing almost anything in that direction except standing absolutely and forever the bimetallic standard of money. But the followers of the new gold demanded the curtail of all the new silver at the expense of the government. They also wanted the treasury notes or certificates to be made legal tender for all debts, public and private. Then they wanted the treasury reserve cut down to \$100,000,000, and the hundred millions of gold now held for the redemption of legal tender notes to be reduced fifty millions. They wanted rather than anything else, first a reduction of the gold standard, and then for all that might be brought into the United States from Mexico or any other country. The rate of coinage silver (about 3 per cent) was to be borne by the government and the operators of silver mines were to receive all the difference in value between bullion and standard dollars. That was the feast to which the senate was invited by the distinguished senators from Colorado and Nevada (Jones and Teller). The wage-cutters of the United States were to be reduced by 10 per cent, and the numerous mills in the country, and he believed that it was now proposed to pay off in cheaper, or in depreciated standard money, the bonds then at the highest prices for anything they had to pay. Could there be anything, he asked, more likely in all parts of the country at an early day, to provoke strikes for higher wages. He believed that by wise and judicious legislation sufficient amount of silver might be mined and yet a bimetallic standard be maintained.

He declared that the pamphlet was first to him was a falsehood, and that it was published in the interest of conspirators against legislation in behalf of the people of Florida.

The conference report on the military academy bill was introduced and agreed to and then the conference report on the emergency appropriation bill was again taken up and the conference system proposed by the bill was discussed. The conference being to the effect that no intoxicating drinks should be supplied in cantons or in cities' stores in states or territories where prohibition legislation existed.

Mr. Allison claimed that the reform recently introduced of substituting the caution for the rule in some cases was a mistake. He presented numerous letters from various military posts, written by captains and majors, in which he stated that the present arrangement was in the interest of good discipline and morality.

The principal object of the members present--barring a quorum--seemed to be to get the house to pass any measure of general importance being called up. 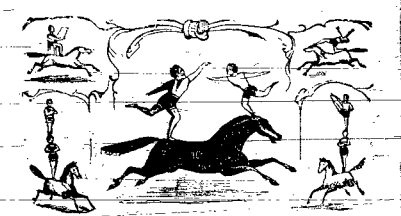

PATENT LEGISLATION.
House to Amend our System and Developed Patent.
WASHINGTON, June 3.--The senate committee on patents, through Mr. Simonds of Connecticut, reported to the house a substitute bill recently agreed upon by the committee instead of a bill to amend the patent laws. One section of the substitute bill provides that an improvement to an invention that has been patented for two years in any journal shall not be patented, and in reference to this the report says: The expense of doing this has not been an application for a patent upon an improvement after that improvement has been described for more than two years in prior patents or printed publications. Under the existing statute two years public use of an improvement in this country is a bar to an application for patent there. The provision of existing laws has proved salutary in operation; the principle underlying that provision, existing law requires that two years of description of an improvement in a patent or printed publication shall also be made to be an application for patent throughout the various states. A larger degree of publicity is generally given to an improvement by two years of description in a patent or printed publication than by an ordinary two years' publication which is almost always local and unknown to the particular locality in which it is made. The latter is a bar to the patent laws, and in regard to the report says: This proposed amendment is based upon the idea that if at the end of five years after the grant of a patent the inventor has not been able to secure a monopoly on what he has done, he should not be allowed to do so. The patent shall expire, and if at the end of ten years the patent of such article is not renewed by payment of tax of \$5, it shall then expire. The purpose is to weed out unproductive and useless patents, to the end that they shall not block the way of subsequent inventions.
