MODE SILVER TALK

Senators Daniels, Allison, Eustis and Vest Are Heard—

AND THE CHY IS MORE TO COME

House Republicans Outcry on the Federal Election Bill—Tobacco and Herbs for Appraisers—Yellow Fever—A Note on Social Events—Other Capital News.

WASHINGTON, June 17.—The senate has concurred in the house amendment to the bill to establish a customs collection district off Puget Sound, and a conference was held.

A message from the house was presented asking further conference on the anti-trust bill. Assented to. Mr. Edmunds said in this connection that it had been stated, and it seemed to him to have been believed, in certain quarters, that the senate amendment to the house amendment to this bill had the effect to repeal or modify the provision of the interstate commerce law prohibiting pooling. This was not the case.

The deficiency appropriation bill for 1890 and 1891 was reported and passed. The house silver bill was taken up and Mr. Daniel resumed the speech begun by him last Friday. He expressed the belief that the message of silver was the only safe and proper exit out of the problem.

Mr. Allison next addressed the senate. The house bill, he said, which was now the pending bill (another bill and amendment having passed away), was substantially the bill proposed by the joint committee which it was the purpose originally, with the exception that the house had added to it a provision for redeeming the bonds and a provision relating to free coinage when silver should come to par. These were the two vital amendments made to the bill as it was originally reported from the finance committee. As he has indicated a special report is expected to vote for that report, substantially, as he believed it was the wisest and on the whole the best solution of the question. The bill having been referred to the finance committee for the second time, the committee had reported back two amendments, one striking out section 9 of the bill relating to free coinage silver a certain joint and one inserting a provision that the act shall terminate at the expiration of ten years. He would support the amendment to strike out the sixth section, but he would not support the amendment limiting the operation of the bill to ten years. He predicted that the limitation of ten years and the insertion of the efficiency of the bill. He did not believe that the bill would last ten years, and he was approaching ten years. He had agreed to that report on two grounds. One of these was that it was necessary to increase the currency under the present emergency and situation. The question to be considered was what currency could be safely substituted for the national bank circulation. The pending bill proceeded on the idea that whatever percentage should be issued should be issued on silver billion purchased by the government in the markets of the world at the market price. Why he asked, had silver billion been selected as the basis for that paper money. It was because the public mind rested in the belief that sooner or later the silver billion would be coined and would become a part of the metallic currency. It was on that basis that he voted for the bill. There were people who believed that the coined dollars in the treasury were useless, and that it would be a wise policy to cease that coinage. As for one, he did not share that belief. He believed that it was just as well to continue them to the utmost limit of four millions a month. But there was a large public opinion against that view, and therefore he contended that the better course would be left in the treasury uncoined. He believed that sooner or later, and he believed very soon, the United States would have to change the number of grains of silver in the dollar, and therefore the dollars now coined would be in fact a provision for the use of silver, pending negotiations that ought to be had for the restoration of silver on some agreed rate by the nations of the world.

Senator Eustis inquired whether the president of an international agreement for silver coinage would be promulgated by the pending law, which would demonstrate.

Senator Allison replied that there was a proposition of silver proposed in the pending bill. Its provision in that respect was the same as in the act of 1876, except that the pending measure provided for the monthly purchase of a half a million more of silver than the act authorized by the act of 1876.

Senator Vest commented upon a remark of Senator Allison as to the "new born zeal" of Democratic senators in the case of free coinage of silver. He made a statement to show that that had always been the Democratic policy. He referred to the resolution which was introduced in the senate in 1870 for the complete redemption of the national debt, and which had been, on Mr. Allison's motion and by the vote of a Republican majority, referred to the finance committee where it had been buried beyond restriction.

Mr. Allison—that was in 1870, but when was that? Mr. Allison's answer during the four years of Mr. Cleveland's administration, that he did not again introduce the resolution.

Senator Vest—Was it the Republican policy to do that?

Mr. Allison—As usual, but not in the same way.

Senator Vest, referring to Senator Allison's remark as to an international agreement about silver, said that if England was a necessary party to such an agreement, a bill for the free coinage of silver might as well be passed in the present session.

Mr. Vest remarked that if the Democratic party said nothing on the silver question in its platform in 1888, it was not because it was in sympathy with the people of the great west and of the majority of the Democratic party.

The remarks discussed at some length the question of fixing a time for taking a vote on the bill, but without coming to any conclusion, at 5 o'clock, went into a recess session and at 6:25 p. m. adjourned.

House. The sturdy civil appropriation bill was taken up.

Mr. Sprague of Texas offered an amendment making a specific appropriation, instead of an indefinite appropriation, for the payment of back pay and bounty.

Mr. Eckery of Missouri, in supporting the amendment, said that the indefinite appropriation canceled the expenditures of \$60,000. A similar clause in the deficiency bill canceled the expenditures of \$30,000. He arranged for the Republican party in the house on the charge of hypocrisy in that, in the last house it had argued the ill-fated bill, the Blair educational bill and the Free-coinage bill and now now of its expenditures and what the passage of any of these necessitates.

In the course of an extended debate Mr. McConr of Maryland, criticized the Republican party for having carried out its promise to the people, while the Democratic party contended with declarations. He predicted the passage of the bill, which would mean a free ballot and a fair count in the southern states.—Mr. Sprague's amendment as far as it affected back pay was agreed to 71 to 66—but as far as it affected bounty, was lost—68 to 70.

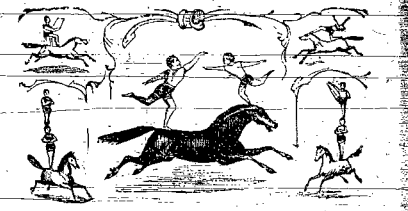
