W. C. T. U. COLUMN. BRIEF REPORT

The minority on the Clayton-Breckenridge Contest.
CHAMBERS' CLAIMS ARE DENIED.
The Senate Passes the General Deficiency Bill—Recognition of the Services of the Late Capt. Ericsson—Mineral Land Legislation—Indian Territory Inroads.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 19.—Through Mr. Mailli of Pennsylvania the Democratic members of the house committee on elections filed a minority report in the contested election case of Clifton R. Breckenridge against John M. Clayton of the Second district of Arkansas. The report is particularly severe on the subcommittee that investigated the conduct of Mr. Clayton, and on the elections committee. After citing the fact that the second district had returned Democratic members in all except one election, and contending that the presumptions, therefore, are in favor of Breckenridge, the report concludes by recommending that this did not conform to the provisions of that act. Clayton could not have been elected without the addition to his returns of the Republican ballots cast at Plimburgh, relative to the instructions given to the judges and the thorough investigation of the case, the report calls attention to the great number of counter charges and issues involved. The sub-committee, it states, reported twelve days in taking reports.

The house may judge upon this, the report says, but the subcommittee is called upon to judge from proceedings still more unusual and shocking, now discussed and which have been handled. Party prejudice made no purpose to occupy the attention of the committee, and the report is a discredited every possibility in the general conduct of the house and the country had a right to expect better things. Some unworthy purpose seems to have actuated the subcommittee, and the compact seems to have forestalled their action; some base and ingenuous attempt is made to mislead the public as far short of the truth as that which this investigation has been a miserable farce and a disgrace to the honor of the country.

PROCLAMATION.
WHEREAS, A joint resolution was adopted by the legislature of the state of Nebraska, at the twenty-first session thereof, approved March 20th, A. D. 1890, proposing an amendment to the constitution of said state, that said section as amended shall read as follows, to wit:
Section 13. That section thirteen (13) of article six (6) of the constitution of the state of Nebraska be amended so as to read as follows:
Section 13. The judges of the supreme court shall receive a salary of twenty-five hundred dollars (\$25,000) per annum, and the judges of the district court shall receive a salary of three thousand dollars (\$3,000) per annum, and the salary of each shall be payable quarterly.
Section 14. That the provisions of the amendment shall be in full force and effect from and after the date of the general election to be held on the 4th day of November, A. D. 1890.
