THE TARIFF BILL.
The House Sends the Measure to Conference.
KENNEY'S ATTACK ON MAT KEAT
The Ocean of Long Debates by Representatives—The Senate Discusses the Land Grant—Keat's Speech—The Tariff Investigation—Other Capital News.

WASHINGTON, Sept. 16.—Mr. McKinley, from the committee of ways and means, reported back the tariff bill with some amendments, with the recommendation that the amendments be adopted in committee of the whole.

Mr. Keat then offered a resolution on the committee on rules, but before it could be read Mr. Eulo of Tennessee rose to a question of privilege. He offered the following:

Resolved, That the clerk of the House of Representatives be directed to communicate to the committee on rules the resolutions of the House of Representatives, introduced on the 14th inst., relative to the character and tenacity of the amendments to the tariff bill in the House.

After two hours general debate it shall be in order to move to reconsider the amendments in gross and agree to a conference on the merits and losses, and the House shall without further delay or adjournment proceed to vote on the adopted amendments.

Mr. Eulo then rose to say to the former and to the latter that this tariff bill was a cheat. Two thousand people were arrested; the law had been broken; 10,000,000 were impoverished. The majority believed in every text enactment—law that it is righteous and just.

Mr. Keat then read the following resolution of the New York said to be an unwilling member of the McKinley tariff congressional limit express trust. The House speaker minor and the Banker's combination were running the train on their own hook and in defiance of the will of the people. He uttered his protest against it. That was all he was allowed to do.

Mr. McKinley said that if the committee on rules had erred in reporting the amendment it was wrong. He invited the attention of the House to the fact

that Mr. Grosvenor said that he had made the point of order because he believed that the act of the House should be in the regular way—by a report from a committee.

Mr. Bates offered an amendment to Mr. Eulo's resolution, directing the publication to exclude from the record Mr. Keat's speech.

Mr. Adams spoke in favor of the Eulo resolution. He showed that the language of the gentleman from Ohio had libeled the old settled rules of parliament.

Rolling motion B. Rowe, on motion of Mr. McKinley, adjourned.
