The Spanish-American Treaty About to Be Made Public.

MORE ON BEHRING SEA MATTERS.

A Large Increase in the Money Circulation Over a Year Ago, but Less than in May—Minister Hoffers's Recall numbered—Person Certificate.

WASHINGTON, June 3.—It is conceded on all sides here that an agreement to maintain a closed season in the seal fisheries of Behring sea will remove all danger of a conflict over the seizure of poachers during the season, and will indicate an earnest purpose on the part of both Great Britain and the United States to reach an agreement on the main question in dispute, but it is still an open question whether or not they will be able to agree on the terms of arbitration. The state department has not yet received a reply to Mr. Blaine's counter suggestions for the questions to be submitted to arbitration, and until a reply is received, the department must remain in doubt as to whether a speedy settlement of the dispute. It is understood that the question was discussed in the cabinet on Monday, and the absence of information from Lord Salisbury no very certain view of the situation. After had. The only information the state department has on this subject is the announcement in the British parliament that Lord Salisbury was about to make a reply to Mr. Blaine which would probably bring the two countries close together. If the questions suggested by Mr. Blaine be submitted to arbitration accepted without change, arbitration will be had at once and the dispute will probably be closed. The state department is confident that the countries can get together on the terms of arbitration.

The Spanish-American Agreement. WASHINGTON, June 3.—Gen. John W. Foster, who has been conducting the recent negotiations between this and other countries for reciprocal relations, is in daily consultation with the president and the officials of the state department about the project of the proclamation that is to announce the Spanish-American agreement is based. He declined to say whether or not this agreement will be formalized very soon, but it is generally thought that in the absence of Secretary Blaine, who is not expected to return in the summer, the president will not wait, but will go into the hands of Secretary Foster that the presence in the city of Secretary Blaine, who exercises only a supervisory control over treaty negotiations, is not at all necessary for the conduct of the business.

Changes in the Circulation. WASHINGTON, June 3.—The treasury department monthly statement of changes in the circulation during the month of May shows a net decrease in the circulation amounting to \$35,028,324. There was an increase in the circulation in silver treasury notes and \$24,719 in the treasury silver notes. On the other hand, there was a decrease of \$10,016,480 in gold certificates, \$2,392,062 in silver certificates, \$1,310,542 in gold and silver coins, \$1,300,920 in gold coin, \$1,324,108 in standard silver dollars, and \$1,115,872 in United States notes. The total circulation of the country on June 1 is placed at \$1,204,270,569, of which \$1,102,000,000 is in circulation on June 1, 1890, an increase during the twelve months of \$98,084,569. The secretary of the navy has appointed a board of officers to meet at the Brooklyn navy yard June 10 to examine applicants for two positions of master of ships.

Secretary Dublin's Successor. WASHINGTON, June 3.—Nothing can be learned at the Mexican legation in this city to confirm the dispatch from the City of Mexico to the effect that Minister Romero had been recalled to assume the office of secretary of the treasury, in place of Senator Dublin, deceased. The secretary of the legation stated that he had been informed of the death of the late secretary of the treasury and as far as they know the office will still vacate. No telegram recalling the minister, he said, had been received.

Person Certificates. WASHINGTON, June 3.—During the week ended May 25 the pension office issued 649 pension certificates of all classes, the average first payment on each amounting to \$119.01.

After an extreme difficulty all were saved but Capt. Zerbst, who yelled out "It's no use, I am going to make it in a few minutes. The other members of the crew were sold off some floating wreckage and kept up until the tug managed to reach them.
