TOO MUCH TO BEAR.

Abused Mr. Bardsley Refuses to Give Evidence.

A BLOODY DEED IN ST. LOUIS.

Ex-Treasurer Woodruff's Expert Testimony.

Philadelphia, Sept. 16.—Another trial in the drama of Bardeleyism was presented in the common pleas court, No. 1, on the sixth floor of the city hall.

John Bardsley, the convicted ex-city treasurer, was the principal actor, and some of Philadelphia's most prominent men took part as defendants, witnesses and onlookers.

The court room was crowded, and it is doubtful if such a gathering as that which occupied every available inch of standing room or sitting capacity was ever seen in a court.

Where learned judges were seated, committing magistrates. John Bardsley was brought from Cherry hill about 9 o'clock, and shortly after was driven to the city hall.

He was in charge of Ward Cassidy. The district attorney narrated the fact that his assistant had frequently visited Bardsley in his cell to obtain testimony but had met with obstruction.

The district attorney concluded, "it which there could be no question as to knowledge as to whose money Bardsley was being paid thereupon. Here the name of John Bardsley was called.

The clerk offered to swear him, but he refused. He said: "I have been taught to believe that there is no value in my words whatever. I have been maligned and I have had to suffer more than I can bear. My self-respect, however, in view of what has been said and done, will not permit me under any circumstances, to give any testimony in this case."

The district attorney here insisted that he should be sworn. Judge Cassidy said: "Bardsley, if it is your duty to take the oath administered to you. You are a citizen subpoenaed here regularly, and it is your duty to take the oath. The other matters will be taken up later."

Mr. Bardsley: "If your honor says so, I will take the oath. Do you know Mr. McCamman?"

"I decline to answer any question at all. I have simply been sworn out of reference to your honors because you think it is my duty."

After a number of other questions had been asked Bardsley, all of which he declined to answer, he finally said: "I have declined to answer any questions. My mind has irreversibly been made up, and no inducements under the circumstances can prevail upon me. It is useless for Mr. Graham to further direct me." Bardsley was then dismissed from the stand.

The Glendonning case was next called, and after a lengthy examination Robert Glendonning and George J. Egan, consulting the firm of Glendonning & Co. Bardsley held in jail such for court on the charge of having aided in the purchase of the bank in his conversion of the public money. Bail was then entered in their behalf.

The cases of the three bank presidents were taken up next. The first case was a question in his mind if the presidents could be indicted, as the law of conspiracy did not cover the case, and he wanted the opinion from the judges as to whether the present deeds of these banks could be indicted for paying interest. After the court had retired for a moment the presidents returned and read their opinion, in which they decided that no action lies against the person paying interest.

EX-TREASURER WOODRUFF'S EXPERT. LITTLE ROCK, Ark., Sept. 16.—The trial of J. F. Day, the expert representing ex-State Treasurer Woodruff in his settlement with the state, on a warrant charging him with the theft of \$100,000 worth of money, which he purloined and loaned the state board in payment of Woodruff's shortage, was continued here. Governor Eagle testified that he had suspected Day of attempting to buy his way out of the state, and had ordered the state board to Woodruff's credit. He charged Day with having counted in \$24,000 in one instance and Day confessed it. The case was continued.

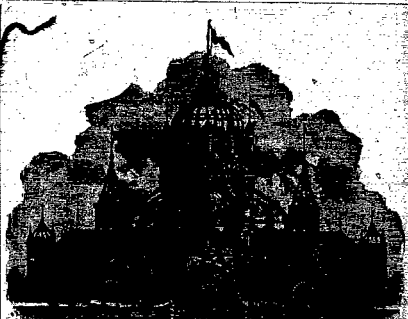
