OHIO'S SENSATION.

Startling Statements Affecting the Governor's Standing.

REFLECTIONS ON MRS. CAMPBELL. The Governor Charged with Stock Speculations and Heavy Debts and His Wife with Extravagance—Prompt Retraction or Libel Suits Will Follow.

COLUMBUS, O., Oct. 7.—The Cincinnati Commercial Gazette reproduced a sensational article relative to Governor Campbell's finances which appeared in the New York Recorder Monday. This article made some startling statements with regard to his government indebtedness, credit, alleged Wall street speculations and manner of living. It charged that he had for years speculated heavily in Wall street and had almost always been a loser. It asserted he had borrowed large sums of John B. McLean, Calvin S. Briton, Dan Lamont, William O. Whitney and even Grover Cleveland. According to the statements of the Recorder the governor—cresus Briton \$65,000 and McLean \$15,000, borrowed in his last campaign, and one Ralph W. Wilkinson, an alleged prominent Ohio politician, \$7,000, estimated that the governor's total indebtedness at more than \$100,000. The article made other sensational statements, some of which reflect upon Mrs. Campbell, who being charged with great extravagance. It also charged that Governor Campbell and his entire family were high livered and that Mrs. Campbell was a gambler. It claimed, further, that there were numerous small bills he owed and failed to pay according to newspaper. The article was more than a column in length and appeared beneath national headlines.

After reading the publication Governor Campbell sent the following telegram to Commercial Gazette, Cincinnati, Ohio: "Unless you retract in your next issue in the broadest and fairest possible language the publication made by you this day and purporting to be copied from the New York Recorder, I shall bring suit against you tomorrow. The man whose name is called Ralph Wilkinson in this article, I never heard of. I do not propose to let you name a man whose name you do not know, or to escape because you are attempting to make my credit and reputation as an honorable man by arising from papers in New York what you have not seen here, but do print direct. You make editorial comment today to the effect that you would be bold and open assumption of responsibility. Your senesit taken from the New York Press the other day was untrue, and libelous, and I shall bring suit upon that also unless you retract." JAMES K. CAMPBELL.

The governor wired his New York attorney as follows: "To Healdy, Lasterbach & Johnson, New York city. Please demand from the New York Recorder immediate retraction of the article in Monday's paper, and as full as can be made by immediate retraction, language to be printed in their next issue; otherwise prepare a petition in libel and send to me. The alleged Ralph Wilkinson I never heard of, and his entire story is a libel without foundation." JAMES K. CAMPBELL.

The New York Press of Sept. 27 contained an article similar to that in The Recorder, and the Philadelphia Press and Detroit News published similar articles in the same character. Private Secretary Meeker demanded retraction from the New York Press in a fiery letter. The New York Press published the letter in its next issue, and applied to it in the same strain printed in the first article against the governor.

The Commercial Gazette reprints the Press article in connection with that from The Recorder. In consideration of this state of affairs, the governor sent the following telegram to the New York Press, Detroit Tribune and Philadelphia Press: "Unless you furnish Mr. Meeker at once the name of your correspondent, as requested by him, I shall sue you for libel. I propose to have satisfaction from either the correspondent or your paper." JAMES K. CAMPBELL.

The United Press representative met Governor Campbell and was most emphatically that the articles published in the morning papers referring to his financial condition were absolutely false. "There is only one item of truth in the entire article," he said, "and that is I owe the telegraph company \$100, which, if they are denied it, they can sue at any time. I do not know anything of the man Wilkinson, and will bring suits at once for libel if retractions are not made."

McKinley-Campbell Debate. CINCINNATI, O., Oct. 7.—There is an armistice today between the contending powers of the Republican and Democratic forces in Ohio. The dominant, Governor Campbell and Major McKinley both rest in order to be better prepared for the joint debate at Ada on Thursday afternoon. Governor Campbell, who is in Hamilton, O., yesterday. Today he is in Columbus. Major McKinley spoke yesterday at Dayton and was in Canton last night, where he will prepare the outlines of his part of the debate. The debate begins at 1:30 p. m. Governor Campbell won the opening and closing address by a vote of 2-1.

ARTICLES OF INCORPORATION.

OF THE Nebraska Normal College Association of Wayne, Nebraska.

The undersigned, whose names are subscribed hereto, and their associates and successors, hereby associate themselves for the purpose of incorporation under the statutes in such cases provided for that purpose in the constitution whose names are signed hereto, and have adopted, agreed to and signed the following articles of incorporation: ARTICLE I. The name of this corporation shall be the Nebraska Normal College Association of Wayne, Nebraska.

ARTICLE II. The business and object of this corporation shall be to organize and maintain a normal school in the city of Wayne, Nebraska, under the name of Nebraska Normal College, and to do all such things as may be necessary or proper to carry out the purposes of this corporation. The undersigned, and their associates and successors, shall be the sole and exclusive trustees of this corporation, and shall have the right to call a meeting of the stockholders of this corporation at any time, and to elect or re-elect trustees, and to remove any trustee, and to fill any vacancy in the office of trustee, and to do all such things as may be necessary or proper to carry out the purposes of this corporation.

ARTICLE III. The annual meeting of the stockholders of this corporation shall be held at Wayne, Nebraska, on the first Tuesday in September of each year. The trustees shall have the right to call a meeting of the stockholders at any time, and to elect or re-elect trustees, and to remove any trustee, and to fill any vacancy in the office of trustee, and to do all such things as may be necessary or proper to carry out the purposes of this corporation.

ARTICLE IV. The board of trustees shall have power to elect from their own number a president and vice-president, and to elect or re-elect trustees, and to remove any trustee, and to fill any vacancy in the office of trustee, and to do all such things as may be necessary or proper to carry out the purposes of this corporation.

ARTICLE V. The private property of the stockholders of this corporation shall be subject to all such claims as may be asserted against them by their creditors, and to all such claims as may be asserted against them by the State of Nebraska.

ARTICLE VI. These articles may be amended at any meeting of the stockholders of this corporation, called for the purpose of amending the same, and the amendments so made shall be valid and binding upon all the stockholders of this corporation.
